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Hovingham features in world premiere at Ryedale Festival



The Ryedale Festival opening concert featured Cheryl Frances-Hoad's (b.1980) world premier of her 'Ryedale Concerto'. She says she was "particularly inspired by the Howardian Hills, Castle Howard and the wonderful North Yorkshire Moors railway"; and the three movements track those domains. "The first movement describes a walk around Hovingham, along the Ebor Way, seeing Ampleforth Abbey in the distance, visiting Stonegrave village and the Minster there. I have tried to reflect the variety of the landscape, from the beauty of the bird-filled hedgerows to the majesty of the hills. At the end the music is a kind of hymn to the landscape, as if viewed from the Howardian Hills."

This concerto was preceded by Noyes Fludde, by Benjamin Britten. And very well played all the music was by the amateur musicians, including some young and not so young players from Hovingham. *Margaret Bell*

Philosophy Talks in Hovingham



This autumn Martin Bell, who is a professor of philosophy, will give four talks in the Village Hall Community Room under the title "What Is Philosophy?" These will be relaxed and informal sessions, assuming no previous knowledge of the subject, and will include time for questions and discussion.

Martin will introduce the answers to the question of what philosophy is given by four thinkers: Plato (Greek, c.429-347 BC), René Descartes (French, 1596-1650), David Hume (Scottish, 1711-1776), and Søren Kierkegaard (Danish, 1813-1855). He will speak about the life and times of each thinker, and about how their ideas have become part of our world. For instance, when we talk about our "guiding star" and "our other half", we are talking the language of Plato.

Hovingham Tennis Club – Fancy Tennis this summer?

We now have a first class tennis court behind the village hall and approximate membership this year is 57 which include 8 family memberships. We have two teams in the Hovingham League, which consists of 21 clubs in three divisions, which for some years now, has been ably run by one of our members. Games are played on a Monday evening, with six players, three men and three ladies, from May to August in different villages and as it is a league rule that you play on at least two courts (so as you are not playing in the dark!) so we use the courts at Terrington Prep School.

We also now have tennis balls and racquets available at the Worsley Arms for holiday makers and for visiting children and grandchildren which can be hired, along with the court, for £5 for two hours. Great News - Superfast Broadband coming in September

According to our Community Plan over 75% of Households in Hovingham and Scackleton have access to the internet. This is delivered using either broadband or dial-up connections by a wide range of Internet Service Providers (ISPs) utilising cables and infrastructure from BT.

It is an objective of central government to improve the speed, capacity and availability of internet services. This means that everyone will have internet access of at least 2 Mbits/sect and 90% of households will have broadband speed of at least 20 Mbits/sec by the end of 2014.

Internet Speed depends on:

- What you and others are doing
- Your ISP, contract and the service they decide to offer
- Your location and quality of cable to "the exchange"
- Your computer and internet equipment
- The applications you are running
- Time of day
- The capacity and performance of the server you are accessing.

Internet speed is normally quoted in "bits per second" and can range from less than 4,800 for a dial-up connection to over 8,000,000 for a good broadband connection. The speed, or lack of it, may mean certain applications will not work and others may be too slow to be usable or reliable.

SUPERFAST NORTH YORKSHIRE CONNECTING OUR COMMUNITY

North Yorkshire County Council (NYCC) has setup *Superfast North Yorkshire* and has commissioned BT to provide this. Fibre-optic cables are being installed to exchanges in this area with the Hovingham exchange expected to be upgraded by the end of September 2013.

Once available it will be up to the various Internet Service Providers (ISPs) to decide whether they want to offer the new service. They will also determine how fast it will be, the capacity, cost and any special equipment that may be needed. In addition to this, you may have an existing contract with your current ISP which may mean a delay in accessing the new service and may extend your contract term.

How much will it cost?

- This will depend on which ISP you choose, the services they offer and which you decide to select
- Your existing internet equipment may need upgrading to take advantage of the increased speed
- Changing ISP **may** save you money, however:
 - \circ may require new equipment
 - your existing contract may limit your options and the cost of changing this

Down on the Farm

It seems that my weather forecasting predictions are excellent!! I finished my last article in March by saying that after all the rain that maybe we will head into a drought soon! Although we may not technically be in a drought, the lovely weather over the last few weeks must mean a hosepipe ban is only a matter of time.

It has been amazing how much the crops have grown over the last couple of months. In the middle of March they looked very small and nothing to get too optimistic about. While there are still areas of the fields that were drowned off or not drilled at all, the crops that are there have come on very well. It is doubtful if they will make up for what is missing but hopefully will go a long way towards it.



This time last year it was very wet. What looked like being a good yielding harvest turned out to be poor because the grains in the ears did not fill properly due to the wet conditions. The words "the warmth to swell the grain" from the harvest hymn *'We Plough the Fields and Scatter '* are so true. Once the ears have emerged in June right through to harvest, they need warmth and sun to fill them and give good yields and good quality corn. Any root crops however, like potatoes, do need water to make them grow. This is why at the moment you will see fields being irrigated to make the roots bulk up.

What would be ideal now after such a difficult year is for the harvest to be warm and dry. It makes life so much easier (and cheaper) if crops can be harvested dry. Once it is over it will then be necessary to get the land in good shape after all the compaction due to rain and machinery travelling over it. This will involve going over the fields with a deep cultivator to break up the compaction allowing the new crop to be drilled into a good free draining seedbed.

Fingers crossed for a kind and productive few months.

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The Worsley's and Hovingham – 450 years

On 7th April 1563 Sir Robert Worsley Kt. purchased the manors of Hovingham, Colton and Holthorpe from his father in law Sir Thomas Gerrard for £3087 13s 4d. This started a 450 year long connection between the Worsley family and Hovingham. The Worsley's were an old Lancashire family who were settled at Worsley, which is outside Manchester, at the time of the Norman Conquest. The year before Sir Robert had sold Ryde in the Isle of Wight so it is likely that the funds for the purchase of Hovingham came from that.

Initially the Worsley's continued to live in Lancashire, not making Hovingham their home until around 1610. In 1683 Thomas Worsley, the great grandson of Sir Robert built a house which was just to the north west of the current house and began to develop, what became his passion, the park and gardens. His son, another Thomas developed these and a series of gardens and canals were created that ran all the way up to Pickering Bridge, which must have been a magnificent sight. His son, yet another Thomas inherited in 1750. He was passionate about horses and architecture and set about building a new house, the current Hovingham Hall. Initially his plan was to build stables to house his stud, and then build a large new house, but in the end he combined the two, which is what makes Hovingham Hall such an interesting and unusual building.

When Thomas 'the builder' died in 1778 the house was not quite finished and not a lot of work was done until his grandson, the first Sir William, inherited in 1830. He finished the work of his grandfather and was created a baronet in 1838. The family have continued to live at the Hall, each generation doing their bit to look after the building and the surrounding estate. The house is now lived in by the great, great, great, great, great grandson of the builder William Worsley with his wife Marie-Noelle and their three children, Isabella, Francesca and Marcus.



May Car Boot - The Sun Shone

Hovingham Village Green became the shopping centre of Ryedale on Bank Holiday Monday. And what an attractive shopping centre Hovingham is. People wandered, browsed and bought at a choice of eighty car boots selling everything from plants to curtains...and everything inbetween!. Delicious home made refreshments were served in the village hall, and it has to be said, they took some resisting.... and not many people had enough willpower to do so. The tombola stall was very entertaining, small children almost climbed into the ticket rumbler to search for their tickets; one determined "customer" had their eye on the whiskey prize and bought a lot of tickets in the hope of winning it, but sadly funds dried up before they were successful (it was actually won by the very next customer, and thankfully the now destitute person did not witness this); a prize of Fairy Liquid was presented to one person who accepted it with a delighted smile – must be the thrill of winning?

The sun shone all morning and the crowds meandered, chatted and soaked up the wonderful atmosphere. It was lovely to see so many people out and about. The event raised over £700 (not including the refreshments in the village hall which was a separate fund raising event). The money will be used to provide eligible residents of Hovingham with a delicious Christmas luncheon. Thank you to all those that worked hard, donated prizes, had a car boot, or came along to buy and browse. It was quite an event, and hopefully one that can be repeated next year, so mark your diary in readiness.

Hovingham School News

After 16 years at Hovingham School, Mrs Lomas retired at the end of this term. She has made a tremendous contribution to the school and we will all miss her a great deal. Her skill with music and drama has helped us put on many school performances with great success. She taught the children French, long before it was a curriculum requirement, which opened them up to a different language and culture. She will leave a big gap but we are committed to maintaining the skills which she has brought to school. We wish her well in her retirement. We have appointed Mrs Sallie Harland to replace Mrs Lomas. She has been in school a few times already so there will be a smooth transition in September.

We have had another full and successful school year with many memorable events. The first was our Christmas pantomime, Sleeping Beauty, with the unforgettable Gangnam style fairy godmothers. Believe it or not Mrs Lomas directed the same pantomime at her first Christmas at Hovingham and one of the parents watching remembered it, even though we had updated and adapted it a bit.

The spring term was very busy too with the school leading the Mothering Sunday service in the chapel and it culminated in the lunchtime Café run by Class 2 in the Village Hall. We were delighted by the way so many people in the village and from further afield came and supported the children. During the last week of the term children from Years 4 to 6 took part in their annual residential visit with those from St. Hilda's and Gillamoor Schools. This year it was an outdoor pursuits visit to Bewerley Park near Pateley Bridge. It was the coldest and snowiest residential we had ever been on, with snow every day and temperatures as low as -5c on the day we went to Brimham Rocks. Still the children pulled on the layers and thoroughly enjoyed themselves.

This term the school held a Summer Concert to showcase the talents of our singers and instrumentalists. We have been taking part in the Wider Opportunities music scheme run by North Yorkshire's Music Service, so every child in Class 2 has had the chance to learn a wind or brass instrument. Hovingham and St. Hilda's hosted the local schools' Sports Day at Ampleforth. Children and parents from our schools, Slingsby, Terrington and Foston took part and luckily the rain held off until we had finished.

There is plenty to look forward to in the next academic year, especially as 2014 sees the school celebrate its 150th birthday. Planning of the celebrations is still in the early stages, but we hope the whole village will join us. *Maureen Skinner*

Although those attending, as in each of the last four years, were privileged to enjoy a recital quality, it is always a little disappointing that more people don't attend. Philip, who before his retirement was Master of Music at York Minster, is a musician of international reputation. Recently a concert was held in London of both his religious and secular music in recognition of his achievements and he continues to serve at Christ Church, Greenwich in Connecticut, a church with a very large music programme. We are indeed fortunate that Philip has chosen to retire in Barton and is willing to give of his time to the local community.
