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Hovingham Village Shop - a new era

As you all know, Margaret and Martin Goodwill have managed Hovingham village shop for the past decade, and are now enjoying very some well deserved peace and quiet up the hill in Wiganthorpe. Their hard work is to be celebrated in Hovingham Village Hall on November 27th.

The shop has been taken over by Mark Blades, a professional electrician who runs Cooper and Westgate, a building and electrical company in York. Mark used to live in Hovingham where he was employed as a newspaper delivery boy, helped out in the shop and worked in the kitchens at the Worsley Arms to earn extra pocket money. Mark has now taken on the long-established Hovingham business, which will be run by his mother, Linda, who worked in the shop about 20 years ago.

Linda, whose husband David is farm manager on the Hovingham Estate, said: "It is going to be an exciting challenge and we are really looking forward to it, especially as I once worked in the shop, and Mark has memories of it when he was a school boy delivering papers each morning."

Mark and Linda will be helped by his wife, Rose, mother of their four children, Ellie, eight, Charlie, seven, Annie, three, and Billy, 20 months, and the family will be moving from their home in Amotherby to Hovingham.

At a time when many villages are losing their local shop, Mark hopes that the shop will grow and is planning to extend it so that it can expand its range.

"One of first moves is to ascertain from the existing customers what they want to see the store selling because it is a shop which covers a number of villages," said Mark.

Hovingham Playground - Dragon makes a comeback in Hovingham 5

Willow tunnels in the shape of a 25 feet dragon have recently been erected on the playground, with a few finishing touches to be done (eyes, nostrils, legs and scales). This unique structure will provide additional play for children and an information board will explain the history of willow and its uses. Our thanks to the AONB for part funding this project and to Chris and Roger (AONB volunteers) who cheerfully helped our team.

We now have a shelter which can also be used as a picnic site and possibly a classroom. A plaque in recognition to Sir Marcus Worsley will be fixed to the shelter and unveiled in the spring.

The Playground Committee have also formed a liaison with Hovingham School looking at further ways to enhance the playground. The school are more than matching our enthusiasm and plans. The project will close in the space under the timber fort/slide and feature a tunnel system as an additional play area. The school will be designing the art work for lining the tunnels with the Playground group providing assistance. We are planning to hold an 'open day' some time in April, with a dragon naming competition and revelation of the tunnels and their unique school artwork. **David Richardson**

Recycling changes from December

Garden waste will not be collected in December, January and February that last collection having been made on the 29th November.. Collections will re-start on **Monday**, **3 March 2014**.

Christmas trees can be taken to the Recycling Centres or can be chopped up and left in the garden waste wheelie bin until collections start again in March 2014.

Changes to garden waste collections do not affect the kerbside recycling service for plastic bottles and cans, glass, and paper and card, which will continue on the current fortnightly pattern. For details of the collection day changes over the Christmas period, a calendar of dates will be printed on a 'luggage style' tag, fastened to your bin as in previous years and the Council's web site will be updated regularly with information for residents.

Ryedale to charge for Green waste collection from June 2014

Nationally, around a third of English councils are already separately charging their residents to collect garden waste, which currently costs RDC £285,730 per year. Members of RDC agreed to introduce an annual fee of £27 for each garden refuse bin to be emptied, from June 2014. This will increase to £36 the following year.

The garden waste scheme is a non-statutory service which many other local authorities already charge for, so residents will be able to choose whether to opt-in or out this service. This change in no way affects the statutory waste services already provided for non-recyclable waste, or other recycling materials collected directly from the kerbside."

The Council's website will be regularly updated so residents are clear on when and how to subscribe to the garden waste collection service (and we will put details in this newsletter when available).

Hovingham Village Hall hosts St Aidan's celebration

"I could do something *really* special in here!" - your village hall is what YOU make of it.

Ampleforth College chef Neil Swales really did do something special in creating a menu themed "Deliciously Yorkshire" at Hovingham Village Hall in September to support his local parish church. St Aidan's Roman Catholic church was celebrating its Golden Jubilee in Oswaldkirk and needed space for 90 diners - and Neil needed plenty of kitchen space to prepare his special meal. As a professional, he was surprised and delighted with the space and facilities designed by Hovingham ladies when it was renovated four years ago.

The diners included 23 visitors from parishes in Hungary and Czech Republic who also expressed delight at the facilities we can sometimes take for granted. This is far from being the first large event held at our village hall and it is always interesting how organisers adapt the space available. Some even put up marquee liners, lay carpets and install gold furniture as part of the service provided of one of our local caterers. Others have more simple catering needs but all of them appreciate what is one of the best village hall kitchens in North Yorkshire. Another professional chef had earlier said the facilities would reduce his costs by at least 10%

More recent upgrades have included much need improvements to the toilets and the main entrance.



This winter will see a new corridor formed to conceal the rather unsightly back of stage area and new, more comfortable chairs.



Down on the farm

What a difference a year makes. The autumn of 2012 was so wet that it was a struggle to get crops drilled. Large areas were left undrilled and then it got even wetter with large lakes of water in a lot of fields. The contrast to this year could not be greater. Most land ploughed very well enabling crops to be drilled into ideal seedbeds.

First to be sown was Winter Wheat, followed by Winter Barley then Winter Oats. Progress was quite fast without many interruptions. Only a couple of problems with the power harrow and drill held me up but that was solved with a welder and the occasional use of a hammer!! A total of 110 acres of wheat, 12 acres barley and 51 acres of oats have been sown.

Next to be sown was Winter Beans. These are sown differently to the cereals as rather than drilled into a ploughed field, they are spread onto the stubble and then ploughed in. The ploughing is then power harrowed to level it and firm it down. This makes it easier next harvest because even if ploughing looks level, it will settle over the winter and end up uneven in places which makes combining it more difficult. 32 acres have been sown and they are now emerging well.

The good weather continued once the drilling was completed, which allowed all the crops to be sprayed. This was to kill any weeds that had grown and also an Aphicide was used. Aphids can become a problem if the weather stays warm. The sprayer has been washed out, antifreeze put in and put away for the winter. Fingers crossed that it can stay there and that nothing comes along for it to be needed. Once the colder weather arrives, the crops will stay dormant for the winter which should keep any weeds and bugs at bay.

The only other field operation that could be done over the winter is to apply some fertiliser. This will depend on how dry it is to travel on the land. The fields are tested on a three year cycle for pH, Phosphate, Potash, magnesium and a few other trace elements. The results influence what fertiliser is to be used and this year I will be using just Phosphate to maintain, and in some fields improve the levels.

Over the last 10 years I have been in a **Countyside Stewardship Scheme**. This was an environmental scheme which involved hedgerow management, grass field margins and wildlife areas and has now ended. However, I have entered into another called the Higher Level Scheme. Next spring I will re-sow some of the grass margins to enhance them. Also other areas will be sown with different grass mixes depending on what type of soil they are on. Hedgerows will continue to be managed to keep them at a width and height that encourages nesting birds.

Hopefully we will not have a wet winter. We really don't need to see water in the fields again! *Mark Wilson*

Burglaries

With the arrival of the dark evenings winter, your local Policing team are concerned at the increased risk of House Burglaries. In the last few days of November we have suffered 2 burglaries, one in Sheriff Hutton, the other in Welburn.

Please consider your home security. Ensure doors and windows are locked. If you have ladders, lock them away. Too many burglaries occur where householders ladders, tools and even garden furniture are used to gain access to homes. If you go out, leave an inside and outside light on. Consider using a timer to turn lights on and off. Leave a radio on to try and give the impression of someone being at home.

Poachers

Poaching is a crime. Poachers don't just randomly kill animals. They damage crops, farm gates and fences. Forget the fanciful image of Heartbeats' 'Greengrass' taking a few rabbits for the pot or to sell to the locals. Modern poachers are either hare coursing with dogs or out shooting wild deer which fetches a considerable price on the black market. Poaching is often used as a front to locate farm machinery to be stolen.

Please be vigilant and report any suspicious activity to the police as soon as possible.

Drink Driving and Speeding

As always, we ask that every resident plays their part in road safety by ensuring they stay within the speed limits on all roads but especially through our villages. You never know with certainty where our mobile speed camera vans will be.

As we head towards Christmas, your local policing team will be taking part in the 'don't drink and drive' campaign. We will be out breathalysing drivers who we consider may have consumed alcohol. Please don't get caught out, drink driving is a crime that wrecks lives.

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


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Book Review - Abraham's Children

Those of you who have lived in the village for over ten years will remember Heather Stroud who lived on the Beckside before moving out to Gilling. Over the last decade or so, she has devoted much of her time and energy in promoting the difficulties under which Palestinians live in Gaza and the West Bank.

She has now published a very readable fiction book called "Abraham's Children", in which she describes the experiences of a young English girl with a Palestinian father when she visits the West Bank. Written largely from the point of view of the Palestinians, Heather who clearly knows the area and the people very well, highlights the obstacles that ordinary peaceful Palestinians have to endure just to exist. It describes vividly a situation that even an increasing number of Israelis realise cannot be sustained. How is that the Western world, which quite rightly would not tolerate apartheid in South Africa, turn a blind eye to what is happening on the West Bank? A book which anyone concerned about the problems of the Middle East definitely should read.

Goodbye to our lovely bus driver Ian

REGULAR passengers on the number 194 bus(Malton - Hovingham- Helmsley) made a deeply poignant journey today - as it took them to the funeral of its popular driver Ian Newby, who died of a heart attack earlier this month. His death at home near Bilsdale, at the age of 47, was completely unexpected and shocked family and friends.

Hundreds packed into Bilsdale's small, remote church, on the North York Moors, where his funeral was held today (Thursday, October 17). Joining many family and friends were dozens of passengers where were brought to the church in the coach Mr Newby drove so many times.

Regular passenger, Marian Hardy, from Barton-le-Street said: "He called everyone by their Christian names. He built up a rapport with everyone who got on his bus." Another regular from Hovingham added: "He would stop us outside our houses if we had a lot of luggage, or if it was bad weather. He was brilliant. We will all miss him." Susan Bowes, from Barton-le-Street, said: "He picked up a lot of school children on his route. He was very popular with them, he knew them all and all their names and would ask about what they were doing that day. He was always happy, never moody. He was just such a genuinely nice person."

- Churchside Telephone Pole Water at the base of the pole has caused it to lean; Yorkshire Water and British Telecom have repaired damage and are happy it is safe.
- Coronation Green Rail Painting This has been started; it needs to be finished together with black straps and top bank. Likely to be completed in Spring.
- **Flooding and Beck** The Environment Agency have strimmed the overflow channel 6 weeks ago. They will be asked to clear possible "restriction" under bridge to Lavender Cottage.
- Litter Bin Liner Still seeking suitable sized liner
- Pasture Lane Development Cllr R. Wainwright reported that there are on-going discussions between RDC and the developer who wishes to revise the planning agreement. The Council Solicitor is dealing with payment of the 2nd tranche.
- Village Hall Planning Application The Parish Council have made a planning application to add French doors to the Community Room on behalf of the Bowls Club and HVHMC.
- Village Name Plates Park Street sign has been replaced.

GENERAL FINANCE

- **2013/14 Finance** Position continues to be healthy.
- 2014/15 Precept and Questionnaire
 - 80% of households who responded were in favour of an increase in the Parish Council Precept; with the majority in favour of a £12 per household per year increase.
 - Councillors will incorporate this result into proposals for the 2014/15 budget and precept to be discussed at the January meeting.
 - Some Scackleton residents felt they could not support the proposed increase as they did not have the same facilities as Hovingham residents.
- Grass Cutting It was agreed not to cut grass again until Spring. Councillor Mrs W. Swann asked for details on Scackleton grass cutting; it was subsequently confirmed that verges in Hovingham and Scackleton were each cut five times by Cliffords in 2013.
