#### Free transport for medical appoinments

Uptake is rising steadily on the new scheme for free transport for medical appointments. However, this is a 12 month pilot scheme which may only continue if proved successful. Feedback is positive but some residents are still unsure about the practicalities.

All patients registered with Hovingham and Ampleforth Surgeries may book trips to medical appointments <u>direct</u> with Ryedale Community Transport (RCT) by calling 69 88 88. Patients do not have to be existing members of RCT although they will become registered free - *for NHS medical trips only*. This covers all NHS medical treatment including visits to dentists. Distances include those as short as within the village and those much further afield. If in any doubt, just call us at RCT - we're here to help you.

The pilot scheme should improve local facilities and save NHS costs on patient transport. Two more Hovingham residents have already volunteered as car drivers this autumn and we are seeking a few more. Please help us to ensure the success of this pilot scheme by supporting it, both as passengers and as volunteers.

#### A big thank you from Kenya



#### **Hovingham War Memorial Upgrade**

Plans to upgrade Hovingham's war memorial are progressing well. Currently, the names are almost illegible and the information is very sparse on both those who died and those who served and returned.

The current proposals, which will shortly go before the York Archdiocese for approval, are for a single stone slab, laid in front of the memorial and engraved with the 16 names of those who died with their ages, place of death and their units. Supporting this inside the church, will be a new edition of an excellent booklet produced by Ryedale Family History Group giving full details of all those serving men who died in both World Wars plus a list of those who served but returned.

#### Children hear a French child's experience of D-Day.

President of Hovingham Royal British Legion Branch, Dennis Anderson, gave the address at Hovingham's Remembrance Sunday Parade and Service - both held inside the church this year because of the weather.

Himself a glider pilot on D-Day, he described how a friend of his had piloted the force which captured the crucial Pegasus Bridge. He described to the children in the congregation how five year old Arlette Gondree was one of the first French civilians to see terrifying, blackedup British soldiers when they entered her café home.

The children then laid poppy crosses on the altar before transferring them to the war memorial outside. Dennis also pointed out that over 50,000 French civilians died during the liberation of France.

#### Down on the Farm

I don't know where the time has gone; it only seems a couple of weeks ago since I was writing about how harvest had just finished and autumn sowing was about to start and now that has been completed. All in all it wasn't such a difficult sowing time with it completed in about five weeks with the occasional rain delay.

There is something quite satisfying about starting a new season of sowing and making a fresh start. All my land is ploughed before drilling which allows any weeds to be buried and any of last year's mishaps to be hidden. Every year I always hope that the fields will be drilled without any operator errors such as blocked drill coulters or slightly wobbly driving. Unlike some modern tractors I do not have the benefit of GPS steering so it is down to good old fashioned concentration and years of experience. Oh well I can always dream of perfection....!

With high hopes of an immaculate sowing time we started with the wheat on 29<sup>th</sup> September. Conditions were pretty good and we got on very well. It is always difficult to know which variety of wheat to use as there are so many to choose from. I grow for the livestock feed market which means the grain doesn't have to meet such high specifications as you need for the bread making market. Milling wheat is more costly to grow and it isn't always guaranteed to meet the required quality. With only about 100 acres of wheat I tend to stick with varieties that are known to me and suit my farm. Also I occasionally put the odd field in with something new to try it out.

Good progress was made and drilling completed on 10th October. If possible I try to roll the fields down after sowing. This helps firm the soil down over the seed, press down any stones that may cause problems for the combine later and break down any clods so the spray will make better contact with the soil and weeds. Most got rolled but if the field gets rained on after sowing it rarely dries enough to be able to roll without compacting with the tractor wheels.



After wheat we started drilling the oats. Again we made fairly rapid progress with just the odd delay due to rain. I always try to keep up with the plough when I am drilling so that if it rains a lot there isn't much ground to dry out. On a sunny day once the soil is turned over with the plough it can dry out pretty quickly whereas soaking wet ploughing can take a few days.

Finally, we sowed the beans. A bit of a different way of sowing as these are broadcast onto the stubble with a fertiliser spreader and then ploughed in. Once ploughed it helps to go over with a cultivator to level and firm the soil. This makes for easier spraying and combining.

Sowing finished on 4th November and it would be lovely to say it was perfection. There is the odd wobbly drill breed when I was playing with the radio to turn Jeremy Vine off on Radio 2 because he was talking about something that made me cross. My view is that you can get more plants in a bent row than a straight one! There is even evidence of the odd blocked drill coulter but I can always say it is a field trial to see how plants grow with more space round them! Why is it that the good fields are away from view and the ones in full view next to the roads are where you have to think of an excuse to tell the neighbours?

NYCC advise that they have received approximately 4,000 objections to the current planning application. Although the formal deadline to comment has passed, you can comment on the application up until the date of the NYCC Planning Meeting when a decision will be made about the application. Also if you have already made a representation to NYCC, you can add to this at any time to take into account 'additional' information.

A letter published on the NYCC Planning Portal relating to the fracking application at KM8 is essentially a request for an extension of time by the North Yorkshire County Council (NYCC) Planning Officer before any decision is made, with a suggested target date **of Tuesday 9th February 2016**. You can read the letter by going to page 54 of the Documents tab on the NYCC planning portal via the link below:

Just to remind you of the timeline on this, the NYCC issued a request for further information from Third Energy on 11th October, which Third Energy responded to on 25th October. Their response is currently out for a 21-day public consultation, which concludes on Wednesday 25th November.

NYCC have identified a number of issues where there are areas requiring further information from Third Energy. To quote from p1 of the report: "There are a number of reasons for this and below you will find a list of the outstanding matters yet to be resolved which, while not exhaustive, nevertheless serves to demonstrate the breadth of scope of the various issues which require attention."

Issues that the NYCC consider remain unresolved include the following:

- How noise at the site will be mitigated
- What will Third Energy use as a noise attenuation barrier?
- The inadequacies of traffic survey, in particular how Flamingo Land traffic would be affected if the work takes place during the holiday season
- Timing of vehicle movements, bearing in mind that the North Yorkshire Police have objected to the timings proposed by Third Energy and are insisting that traffic to the well should stop by 4pm
- Lack of clarity in respect of the vehicle routing
- The effect of HGV traffic and abnormal loads (of up to 60 tonnes) on the Kirby Misperton bridge over Costa Beck, which is a Grade II listed structure
- The time of day when the fracking process would take place
- The effect of vibration on local heritage assets, including the church at Kirby Misperton
- Inconsistencies in the amount of water used in the fracking operation
- Whether the pipeline can be used for contaminated waste water as well as fresh water
- The visual effect on the landscape character of the multi-coloured ring of shipping containers (which are to be used to reduce the sound heard in nearby villages)
- Inadequate Habitat and Species Assessments, including the lack of a Bat Survey, the impact on nearby Barn Owls and other protected species, and the effect on the River Derwent Special area of conservation
- The inclusion of a production phase of nine years, without providing any details

It is also worth noting that Frack Free Ryedale's 335-page objection, with sections written by independent environmental and other technical specialists include many issues relating to this application. Some examples include:

- the need for a comprehensive ecological survey;
- proper adjustment of the background noise level calculations appropriate for a very quiet rural setting;
- revisions to air quality data submitted by Third Energy (Table 2.4, version 10) in some cases exceed the annual maximum levels eg benzene;
- more details are needed about the alternative noise attenuation barrier which should be site specific.

#### Ryedale Local Area Plan - Have Your Say

#### What is the Ryedale Local Area Plan?

- Ryedale District Council (RDC) are producing the *Ryedale Local Area Plan* detailing their planning policy, strategy and potential development sites, until 2027.
- RDC requested potential developers to submit details of potential sites they may wish to develop.
- They received details of many more sites in Ryedale than required, so only those sites in the Market Towns and Service Villages, of which Hovingham is one, are now being considered for inclusion.
- In 2009, an exhibition and consultation regarding the Plan took place in Hovingham.
- RDC have identified sites for 160 dwellings in the Service Villages using a Site Selection Methodology as "very likely for development" (Group 4) sites, detailed within their plan.
- They are encouraging development in villages which have not received any meaningful development in recent years.
- There is one Group 3 site, 643, located in Hovingham which would be considered for development if insufficient Group 4 sites were delivered or deliverable. There are no sites in Scackleton accepted for the Plan.
- RDC are now consulting on the potential sites which is due to finish on **14**<sup>th</sup> **December** this year.

#### What is it not?

- **Does Not** give planning permission for any developments; a full planning process will take place on each site when Planning Permission is finally sought, when all residents and organisations are encouraged to participate.
- **Does Not** exclude the future development of a site not included in the Plan
- Does Not apply to the development of individual or small groups of buildings

**How were sites selected?** Ryedale District Council asked potential developers to submit details of possible sites and RDC have then used the *Site Selection Methodology* (SSM), to place them in one of four groups:

**Group 1** Not suitable for allocation for proposed development types

**Group 2** Very unlikely concerns can be mitigated, or sufficiently mitigated, not considered deliverable/developable

**Group 3** Issues identified, mitigation could be used to reduce impact / achieve an acceptable form of development

**Group 4** Performs well across each of SSM stages and are preferred

Four *Group 4* sites are selected in the Ryedale Service Villages:

Site 8 Amotherby (circa 19 units)

• Site 430 (incl. site 464) - Slingsby (circa 73 units)

Site 51 Sheriff Hutton (circa 15 units)

Site 638 Rillington (circa 17 units)

Initially only these will be chosen however, *Group 3* sites may be required if there are subsequently insufficient *Group 4* sites.

#### Scackleton & Hovingham Sites

- Both Scackleton sites were rejected.
- One site 643, in Hovingham, is *Group 3*; and this may be included in the final plan for developments if there are insufficient *Group 4* developments delivered or developable.
- The other six sites in Hovingham are *Groups 1, 2 or 2-3* and are not included.

#### What to do next?

The Parish Council have met with the Hovingham Estate, to discuss the proposed development of site 643, and sent their observations to Ryedale District Council.

We encourage residents and businesses to contribute to this important Consultation on the Local Area Plan.



#### Fundraisers - indulgence for the senses

The first **Celebrate Ryedale Christmas Fair** was held in Hovingham Village Hall and attracted visitors from across the region. The event was an indulgence for the senses with some of North Yorkshire's finest rural artists, designers and artists, showcasing their work. Walking into Banks Music Publications is a wonderful experience. Housed in the eaves of Wath Court, the wooden beams create an appropriate backdrop for the most comprehensive choral music collection in the UK.

I'm greeted warmly by Rose and David Goodwin who bought the business from Margaret Silver in 2014. David is preparing the day's outgoing post including an assignment of music scores destined for America. Reflecting on their unique business, David & Rose now receive 40% of their business from outside the UK, notably America, Hong Kong and mainland Europe.

A normal day involves contact with composers and choir leaders, processing online orders. There is a calm efficiency underpinned by deep musical knowledge with Rose's background in music and David's earlier career as a professional actor. Choir leaders regularly visit and spend several hours in the Choral Centre, where sample folders of choral music line the walls, using the piano to make their final selections.

With thousands of customers world-wide, one of the biggest customers is in Nashville where there is a great demand for English Anglican church music. The latest trend in Hong Kong apparently is for quaint English folk songs.

Composers also send in their new scores to be published, often generated using specialist software and occasionally to be typeset from a hand written manuscript.

This couple clearly enjoy what they do and are indebted to Margaret who previously ran the business. "If it wasn't for Margaret we wouldn't be here. She has been incredibly supportive to us and we continue to be great friends"

(This business has long associations with Banks Music shop in York dating back to 1785). Ramsay and Margaret Silver bought the publishing arm of Banks Music shop in York (one of the oldest publishing companies in Europe) in 1972. Today, the new owners are very much looking to the future working with up and coming composers and publishing their works.

On 21st May 2016, Rose and David will be supporting a Choir Music Workshop at All Saint's Church, Hovingham, led by Dr Simon Lindley, the Director of Music at Leeds Minster, a well known composer and organist.

#### Your Local Neighbourhood Watch

Thankfully the level of crime in Ryedale remains very low however, the impact on victims of crime remains great and there are ways that you can continue to help the Police.



Your Local Neighbourhood Watch encourages residents to report

anything suspicious to the Police non-emergency number 101 or in an emergency dial 999 immediately.

**Cold Callers -** The Police have received a number of reports of Cold Callers going door to door in the area. Please report any Cold Callers to the Police as soon as possible.

**Poachers** - Lamping with dogs to hunt for Hare and Deer, both during the day and night, increases while the crops are short. There have been more reports of sightings of suspect vehicles and people on land with dogs.

If you see anyone on land whom you suspect may be acting illegally, please contact the Police. They now have specific powers to deal with such offences and, under certain circumstances, can seize vehicles and dogs.

**Cyber Attack -** *Talk Talk*, the phone and broadband provider, has been the victim of a cyber attack on their website. This has led to hackers stealing personal data. It is not known exactly what data has been stolen but *Talk Talk* has said that some personal and financial information could have been accessed.

Please beware of calls, or other communications, pertaining to be from *Talk Talk*, the call may be from criminals who will attempt to gain your confidence by having confidential information about you, who will then try to extract money from your bank or credit card account.

**Protect Yourself NOW** - Some simple precautions everyone should take now to protect themselves

- **BE WARY of any emails, phone calls or other communications**, claiming to be your bank, shops, phone companies or Microsoft. If you are suspicious, hang up, wait 15 minutes, and then contact your bank or the company back using contact details on their statement or website, ideally using a different phone line or send them an email.
- No legitimate caller will ask you for personal information such as passwords or account details. Sometimes criminals may ask you to make a small payment using your bank debit or credit card, and will then remove a considerably greater amount, or take more than one payment from your account.
- **DO NOT open suspicious email attachments**, or allow anyone access to your accounts or computer remotely.
- ➤ **DELETE suspicious emails immediately** pertaining to be from organisations you do not deal with, eg where it is addressed to "Dear Sir", contains spelling or grammatical mistakes.
- > Install an active and current Firewall and Anti-Virus program on your computer, and keep it current. Often your Internet Service Provider provides this free-of-charge; eg BT include Mcafee free with your subscription.
- ➤ **NEVER divulge your personal and financial information** to any caller or sender of an email. Legitimate organisations will not ask you for these details nor ask to transfer money to another account.
- Monitor your bank and credit card accounts regularly and report any possibly fraudulent activity to your bank, and if appropriate the Police.
- To contact the Police in an emergency dial **999**, otherwise dial **101** for non-emergency calls

#### **GENERAL - Hovingham & Scackleton**

- **Grass Cutting** NYCC grant now reduced by £364.30 for next year. The Parish Council will continue to cut greens and verges to same quality as previous years.
- Ryedale Local Area Plan
  - Responses for the consultation must be received by RDC by 5pm on 14<sup>th</sup> December.
  - Residents and businesses effected by the proposals are encouraged to take part.
  - No sites in Scackleton have been selected because it is not a Service Village. One site in Hovingham, behind Worsley Arms, is included.
  - o Further details elsewhere in this Newsletter.
- NYCC Community Awards The Hovingham Village Market were finalists for the Community Project Award; won by a Harrogate Homeless Project.
- **New railings** up by Mt Pleasant will be painted in the Spring once the metal has weathered.

#### **SCACKLETON**

- Road Repairs Residents are disappointed with the response from NYCC and residents are encouraged to report via the NYCC website.
- Traffic There is concern regarding refrigerated vehicles travelling through the village. Residents are encouraged to report possible violations to the RDC Planning Department, or the Parish Council, ideally with photographic evidence.
- Mobile Phone Mast Nothing further received, funding window is now closed.
- "Slow Down Children Sign" Scackleton Action Group are proposing to purchase this sign.

#### **FINANCE**

- It was agreed that the Precept for next year remains the same as this and last year.
- Publicity for the Local Plan was agreed and is within the Chairman's allowance.
- Parish Council finance continues to be healthy.

#### **Any Other Business**

- Mr. F Colenso Has offered to speak to Parish Council regarding traffic impact of proposed fracking applicated. Residents and Councillors will have seen his supplement included within the last Newsletter and are encouraged to discuss anything arising directly with him.
- Church Clock The PCC are considering electrification of the church clock at an estimated cost of £5,000 to £6,000. The PCC proposed to ask for funding from the Parish Council.

### North Yorkshire County Council (NYCC) from Councillor Clare Wood

- NYCC are having to find further savings; details will be available after Christmas and the Chancellor's Autumn Statement.
- Residents are encouraged to report pot holes, in the road, online using the NYCC website.
- As part of a pilot scheme, each Councillor has £5,000 per year for the next two years for Community Initiates.
- Winter gritting routes have not been cut however, the number of grit bins and heaps has been cut significantly.

#### **HOVINGHAM**

- Action Group A report was submitted and is included elsewhere in this Newsletter. A grant has been received to rewrite and new host for the Village and Market websites.
- Cemetery Maintenance Continues to be monitored.
- Pasture Lane RDC Enforcement Officers are in communication with the owner of the land, developer and NYCC as to the provision of the wearing surface of the road and pavements. Residents are encouraged to make representations to the RDC Planning Department.
- Hand Rail York Hill Acquired by the Estate, awaiting installation.
- Replacement/Repair Posts on Top Green New posts purchased and to be collected. No further progress to find someone to carry out work.
- Fence between Village Hall and Stone House -This is now in dangerous condition and the Hovingham Estate are getting quotations for its repair/replacement.
- Flood Emergency Plan Co-ordinator and Review Councillor Ms. M Gripaios agreed to meet Mr. D Richardson to takeover and review the plan.
- Recycling Centre The condition has been a cause for concern over the Summer. Volunteers had removed rubbish and tidied up the site on two occasions. Monitoring to continue and an article on recycling to be included in next Newsletter.
- Beck Maintenance The Environment Agency has carried out maintenance resulting in the water level at the Ford being lowered by 6 inches. The Agency will be contacted regarding clearing above the bridges on Brookside.
- **Grit and Grit Bins** The Parish Council have agreed to purchase two deliveries of 2 tonnes to service grit bins and payments. The cost is within the budget.
