Hovingham Supermobile Library Arrives



From October 24th North Yorkshire County Council's new Supermobile has visited Hovingham on Mondays 5 – 7 pm on a fortnightly timetable. The two hour visits provide a much longer opportunity for users to take advantage of the service.

The Supermobile offers a superior service, carrying around 3,000 items of stock – including books, DVDs, videos, and audio books - and offering internet access via satellite.

In weeks when it is not in Hovingham the Supermobile is in Slingsby, Fridays 2pm-4pm

A spokesman for NYCC said: "By designing a schedule based on two-hourly stops, we hope that the Supermobile might in time become a focal point for other community services, much in the way that static building-based libraries are used by a wide range of organisations such as citizens' advice."

SNOW Clearing in Hovingham

Hovingham is very lucky in having a loyal band of village volunteers who carry out a number of tasks to keep the village as pristine as possible. Last year these volunteers also decided to band together to remove snow from designated footpaths and roads in the village to keep the village moving.

It wasn't expected snow would come in the quantities which fell, but the volunteers found if they shifted the snow regularly it was much easier. If it was left and froze this proved much more difficult and time consuming to move. The hearty band of volunteers fully supported each other but the group would welcome others to join them. Whatever time could be given would be appreciated.



It would make the job much easier if residents could clear outside their own properties. Likewise where other, possibly older residents, are unable to clear the snow fronting their properties it would be a benefit if they could be given assistance. To aid all residents salt/grit will be made available to prevent ice forming and snow lying. This would certainly be of help where steps and gradients may be a safety issue.

There is no law preventing the clearing of snow and ice on pavements and pathways. Anyone doing so provided they are careful and use common sense would be very unlikely to face legal liability.

More Nurse Appointments

Hovingham surgery now has more nurse appointments available, Fiona Amer will continue to work Wednesday mornings from 8.30 and Fiona Darrell on Fridays from 9.30. We hope these additional appointments will meet the needs of patients who attend Hovingham.

Prescription Delivery Service

Patients who have trouble collecting their prescriptions can request for their medications to be delivered. Frances delivers on a Friday afternoon and we ask that you are at home to receive the delivery.

Caring with Confidence

Scarborough & Ryedale Carers Resource are running sessions at Hovingham Surgery to help people who care for someone at home. This course would be really useful for all unpaid carers, such as spouses/ parents or children of patients who require support to continue to live at home. The next meeting is on December 6^{th} from 1pm – 3pm at Hovingham Surgery aimed at unpaid carers over 18. Please book a place by contacting the surgery or Carers Resource directly on 01723 850155.

More doctor appointments at Hovingham

Dr. Manners now works a full day each Monday and is able to offer appointments in the morning and afternoon at Hovingham and an evening surgery at Ampleforth. You can collect full details of the surgery times from either surgery.

Did you know

- You can order your prescription for the next months repeat medications when you collect your next prescription from the surgery each month. Ask the reception team to explain how the system works and save yourself a phone call each month. This system works best for patients who take medication regularly.
- There are appointments available every day to see a doctor, if you need a same day appointment please ring either reception from 8.30am until 10am.
- You can book appointments months in advance take advantage of being able to book a day and time that suits you
- Appointments are available outside of normal surgery times with Dr. Mechie from 7.00am 8.30am on alternate Wednesday mornings and Dr. Black offers Saturday morning appointments from 8.15 10am once a month. These are at Ampleforth.
- There are now nurse appointments available on some Saturdays please ask if you would prefer a Saturday appointment, these are also at Ampleforth.
- There is a transport assistance scheme that helps patients attend hospital appointments, please ask at reception for details.
- If you help look after someone who has difficulty remembering when to take their tablets ask the doctor about having a dosing box each week. The dispensers will then make up a disposable box with separate compartments for each day and for the different times of the day. We could deliver these each Friday by using our prescription delivery service.

Scackleton Action Group News

Telephone Box: This has been cleaned using cleaning soda, however this has not been sufficient and some of the glass was damaged. All the glass has now been removed, framework cleaned using sand blasting and professionally repainted before new glass is installed. The post box has not yet been touched.

Gritter and Grit: A suitable spreader has been identified; a number of questions need to be answered regarding NYCC and grit prior to ordering. A supply of grit will then be acquired.

The Wall: Working with the AONB to agree the plan and a visit from the stone mason is expected shortly.

Defibrillator: The Group need to ensure there will be sufficient volunteers prepared to be trained to use the defibrillator. A village meeting with St John Ambulance present was suggested to take place most likely in January.

Market Cafés: Two 2012 cafés have been booked; 2nd June for the Action Group and 6th October for Village Church.

Neighbourhood Watch Scheme: The existing scheme has lapsed and everyone feels it would be a good to resurrect the scheme, perhaps combined with the defibrillator meeting.

Diamond Jubilee Celebrations: A combined celebration with Hovingham is planned for Monday 4th June 2012, to be held on the cricket field at Hovingham Hall, by kind permission of the Worsley Family.

The next Scackleton AG meeting is scheduled 7:30pm on 10th Jan 2012.

Hovingham Action Group News

The Group and sub-groups have now completed, or suspended, projects for the Winter, with the following projects currently in progress or recently completed. However, the 'team' is now on high alert for any snow falls which may occur.

We were very proud to be finalists in all three categories we entered in the Ryedale Rural Awards 2011; The Hovingham Action Group won the Rural Community Group of the Year and the Hovingham Village Market Group won the Community Project of the Year under £10,000; recognising the achievements of the Groups and the volunteers, with the support of the Community and Parish Council.

Bee Project

The wildflower planting area is now being developed in the Playground and homes for insects and bees are now being built. Our second hive is, so far, settling in well.

Craft Bring, Share & Enjoy Event – 26th October 2011

37 residents and organisations, including the Hovingham Village School, exhibited their crafts at an exhibition in the village hall. Well over 100 residents and their guests visited the exhibition which was a great success.

Hovingham Open Gardens 2012

We are now determining if the gardeners of Hovingham would like to open up their hidden treasures next year. In addition, we are looking for volunteers to help organise this event and perhaps some additional activities for visitors on the day.

Hovingham Snow Clearing

Additional equipment has now been purchased and more grit ordered for this year's project. A meeting has already taken place to coordinate with the farmers and volunteers who have already offered to help. Additional volunteers are still been recruited to complement the team. We hope to this year pilot distributing grit to Hovingham residents wanting to clear their own paths.

Nature Watch

There are few birds in the garden. The RSPB say the birds are off feeding on natural seeds and berries elsewhere – I wonder if it is the Sparrowhawk that is paying regular visits to our garden? There are still a few honey bees about, enjoying amongst other things, the flowers on my going to seed broccoli/calabrese, which I resisted pulling out as usual and left for the bees instead.

Feeding the birds

We have noticed the great leap in prices for bird seed over the last few years and was glad to find this advice from the RSPB on how to feed your garden birds more cheaply. Calorie rich foods like mixed seed, nyjer seed and peanuts as well as kitchen scraps like mild grated cheese, cooked rice and pasta, unsalted bacon and cooked potatoes are great for birds, and provide them with energy in the winter months. Now is the time to increase feeding quantities. New developer helps local residents to drain village hall car park

A new drainage scheme has now been installed in the village hall car park. For many years there have been frequent deep puddles and a particularly torrential downpour at a recent market flooded out several stalls.

To eliminate the puddles would require a complete regrading costing well over £20,000; Richard Orange-Bromehead resident civil engineer came up with a more realistic solution - a 75ft long trench with a "tank" four foot below the surface, topped with gravel. This should absorb up to an inch of rain an hour, leaving smaller shallower puddles in low spots. The tank would then act as a soakaway.

Even this scheme was originally over £2,400. A grant *might* be available next spring but it was felt that any delay would be damaging to hall users. These include two forthcoming wedding receptions and the monthly market whose café nets around £6,500 each year.

Thankfully, local skills, effort and support brought the scheme within an affordable budget. Simon Flint, of Maplebrook Homes Ltd at the Pasture Lane housing development, very kindly provided the vital aquacells and membrane at \pounds 650 below the builders' merchant's price and Mark Wilson handled the spoil and gravel in-fill, reducing costs to about \pounds 1,600.

Thankfully, the scheme has now passed its first test, coping well with rain ahead of - and during - the November market.

Alcohol and music regulations eased for village hall users

Recent changes in two regulations will help users at the Village Hall:

- Anyone wishing to charge for drinks at a *private* event may now do so without an individual alcohol licence. This includes events with tickets providing the name of the purchaser is shown on his/her ticket. Events involving alcohol must still be notified to the booking secretary when booking the hall: such bookings are taken at the discretion of the hall committee.
- Next year, music may be played in the village hall under two special licences held by the hall. This replaces the need for event organisers to obtain individual entertainments licences.

Hovingham with Scackleton - Parish Council News

The Parish Council (PC) met on Wednesday 16th in the Community Room at Hovingham, there were eight electors present. The following items were discussed and decisions made:

Ryedale Rural Awards; The PC congratulated Mark Woolley, Phil Chapman and the Hovingham Action and Market Groups on winning the Community Group and Project under £10,000 awards.

Welcome Pack; This pack is delivered to all new households; this has now been revised and the Clerk will hold copies.

New House Bonus; The government has paid this to local councils, including Ryedale, who have decided to keep 50% to promote local businesses and the rest for Communities where the new houses are built. It is expected that Hovingham should receive an allocation of just over \pounds 1,000 which they can for apply for next year.

Community Newsletter; The Parish Council congratulated and thanked the Newsletter Group on their first edition and the level of contributions received from residents and organisations, and looked forward to the next (this) edition due out at the start of December.

Deputy Flood Warden; David Richardson has confirmed he will deputise for and assist Mark Wilson. Volunteers are still needed to help, please contact Sue Wainwright if you are interested.

Parish Liaison Meeting; Councillors Ian Battersby and Phil Chapman attended; The New Home Bonus, planning and roads were discussed. The PC received a formal response to their questions of concern regarding Planning, essentially saying that only legal grounds were sufficient to stop planning applications. The PC advise residents that to try and reach a compromise with the applicant will deliver the best result, insisting the Planning Officers help mediate this. Councillor Margaret Bell asked what could practically be done about increased commercial traffic in Park Street, the PC agreed to contact the Highways Department and Moseys directly, with copies to Clare Wood and Ryedale Planning.

Library Supermobile; This has now visited twice, each time to different locations. It was agreed the new library was a significant improvement and should be supported; Councillors Robert Wainwright and Phil Chapman have met with County Councillor Clare Wood and she is progressing concerns regarding the incorrect positioning and night time use of the Supermobile. The PC suggested that the library could park in Hall Green overcoming the parking and lighting problems, the Parish Clerk will ask the Estate if they will give permission for this, Councillor Phil Chapman will contact County Councillor Clare Wood.

Village Seats; These have now been taken in for the winter and will be "treated".

Railings; Paint has been purchased by the PC and Peter O'Rourke has kindly agreed to paid the straps black. There was concern over the state of the Hall Green railings and the Parish Clerk will contact the Estate regarding this.

Various Correspondence Received; The Parish Clerk highlighted that the vehicle activated signs would be leaving for Beadlam/Nawton w/c 5th December for three months and that the Winter Maintenance equipment requested by the Hovingham and Scackleton Action Groups from Ryedale had been ordered and would arrive shortly.

Dog Waste Bin; A resident requested a new bin be installed on the grass near to Hall Farm, this was approved.

Damage to Grass Verges; A resident requested that the PC install laminated signs on Church Street verges to stop vehicles damaging the grass. The PC agreed that it was parked vehicles that caused buses and other heavy vehicles to cause the damage, and agreed that laminated signs would be ignored, knocked down and cause further mess.

Ducks; A resident has requested road signs to warn motorists of our current colony of ducks wandering around the village and hopefully avoid accidents. The PC agreed that the signs would not really avoid accidents and could add to the clutter of excess signage.

Action Groups; Scackleton and Hovingham AG reports were presented and discussed; these are covered elsewhere in this Newsletter.

Diamond Jubilee; A working group has been formed of Community Groups and both Hovingham and Scackleton will be taking part and contributing in the event. It was agreed that the PC should underwrite by up to £300 the event, with the Estate, Hovingham Action Group, the Hovingham Village Market Group and the Village Hall also underwriting the expenditure which is being kept to a minimum. Scackleton have agreed to kindly lend their marquee and various local businesses will provide entertainment and additional refreshments.

Village Hall Car Park; Rob Thompson presented the project costing about £1,550 to reduce the impact of rain on the car park; it was agreed that the PC would contribute £300 to this work to help alleviate the drainage problems.

Finance Update;

- Position is still healthy with cemetery income remaining down; with new expenditure agreed tonight it is still likely a small surplus would be achieved for the year.
- Audit report has been received and except for a box not being ticked regarding Trust Funds, which the PC has none, the PC received a clean bill of health.
- > Groups who received £2,000 Participatory Budgeting grants are reminded they need to complete their claim by 31st March 2012.

Parish Precept; It was agreed that the Precept for 2012-13 should remain at £3,179, the same as this year.

Privacy Policy; It was agreed that everyone should be reminded of the Parish Councils legal obligations to disclose written material under the Freedom of Information Act and that confidential documents may need to be published.

Information Security – Part 1 - MAIL

Information is knowledge - knowledge of the bus time-table, knowledge of the cooking times for chicken, knowledge of when to plant vegetables, and knowledge of how to part you from your hard-earned money.

Personal & commercial Information is a valuable commodity. Don't give it away!

MAIL. Unwanted mail is a pain. We are bombarded daily with offers of this and cut price that. Nothing serious - just unwanted. There is however, another type of letter that seems perfectly benign and innocuous, but is definitely not safe. These letters offer you a free entry in a prize draw. Or may offer you, in one guise or another, "something for nothing". What these letters are intended to do, in fact, is to gather information on you. You are asked for simple answers to simple questions. It would appear quite harmless on the surface, but you could end up playing 20 Questions with your identity as their prize!

If you do not wish to receive junk mail the answer is simple. If you are "on the net", go to www.mpsonline.org.uk (Mail Preference Service), and follow the on-screen instructions. Alternatively you can telephone 0845 703 4599. It is quick, simple and FREE. If you are not in a position to access the Internet, simply ask a friend who is, to do the deed for you. After about a month the junk mail dwindles down to practically nothing. Be aware however, that International junk mail might still get through.

An elderly relative told me that she had received a Scam letter from a so-called clairvoyant. As pleased as punch she went on to say that she had replied to his letter and told him that that if he was any good at his business, he would know that she wasn't interested. I had to burst her bubble. I had to tell her that by answering the letter, she had confirmed a viable name & address that could be, and would be passed on at about £1.40 a time to other "clairvoyants" etc. To her annoyance, these letters increased umpteen fold. Luckily, MPS sorted out most of them.

Although not physical mail, junk phone-calls are probably even more annoying than unwanted letters, and can, on occasion, be just as unsafe. An unguarded reply can cause untold problems. To stop these 'phone calls the answer, once again, is simple, and once again, free. On the Internet, type in www.tpsonline.org.uk (Telephone Preference Service) and follow the instructions. Alternatively, you can telephone 0845 070 0707. This service is available for both land-line and mobile 'phones. Within a month these unwanted phone-calls will all but cease, but once again, International calls might still get through.
