Roadworks from Hovingham to Slingsby

The roadworks (resurfacing) from the 30mph sign at Hovingham to Slingsby have again been rescheduled – so it is not possible to give the dates. The dates are movable and weather dependent and have already been changed three times! The plan was as follows so it might be helpful for you to see what might be in store. Of course this plan, like the dates, may change.



1. Works from the corner of Park St into High St, to take two or three days. A convoy system will operate but there is a ban on HGVs. Pedestrian access will be possible for residents all the time but there may be times when getting the car out will be difficult!

2. Works from the 30mph limit in Hovingham to Slingsby crossroads. This should be for ten days to two weeks if weather is kind, and no other serious interruptions. It is unclear at this stage how access to Wath Court is to be managed.

3. All except early and late school buses to Malton will be diverted from Hovingham, through Terrington to Coneysthorpe, up to Slingsby and on to Malton. The Malton bus journey will take longer (45 minutes) and there will to be fewer trips.

4. Waste collection to be as usual, probably a bit earlier so that they can get in and out. Emergency vehicles will be able to get through but the closure of the road both ways is to protect the workforce.

When/if it does happen we all hope there will not be too much inconvenience. If there is a sudden need like a Doctor's visit or collection of prescriptions people may have to seek help from friends and neighbours. In emergency tel. Jill Knight (01653 628977).

John Putsey (N York's officer in charge of the project (tel. 0845 8727374) and Stephenson's (01347 838990) are both helpful if there are problems. Both they and the Parish Council have given us much assistance.

The Parish Council, the Environmental Action Group & residents have developed a plan and strategy for our community to use in case of emergency in the village. This is actively supported by North Yorkshire County Council, the Environment Agency and other organisations. It is essential no one puts themselves or others at risk and the primary objective is to reduce risks to the community.

Background:

- > Hovingham is susceptible to flooding being low lying with hills surrounding it and a fast flowing beck.
- Flood defences, especially the dyke bypass implemented in 2000, together with preparations made by residents, have worked well and avoided major incidents. However the village is still vulnerable to a severe storm, failure of the ditches, or some other unpredictable event or emergency.
- > The Emergency & Flood plan is designed to help the community prepare for and reduce the impact on any who may need help.

Flood Warning System:

- Residents can register with the Environment Agency who monitor the level of the water and forecast when to issue an advance warning. To receive flood warnings (ranging from an alert to a severe flood warning by phone, fax or email) call 0845 988 1188.
- A Flood Warden has been appointed to provide direct contact with the Environment Agency and to raise local awareness and preparedness. The Flood Warden leads a Community Response Team of volunteers, and during an emergency oversees activities until emergency services arrive, and after flooding provides assistance as necessary.

What to do now?

- > All residents should check they have adequate property and contents insurance. Householders at risk from flooding without insurance are encouraged to obtain household insurance from a reputable company. However this is entirely the decision and responsibility of the householder/tenant.
- You may consider making improvements to your property to reduce the impact and damage such as raising door thresholds, sealing floors, covering air bricks and fitting non return valves to drains & pipes. Insurance companies should be advised of this as it could reduce premiums or excesses.
- Everyone at risk of flooding should know how to turn off their electricity. After floods have receded electricity supplies should not be touched by unqualified persons until it has been checked. Oil heating should also be checked before being turned back on.

What to do if an alert or warning is issued?

- > Double-check you are prepared, and if appropriate act.
- > Make neighbours aware as they may not be aware of the alert or warning.

What to do if flooding or some other emergency occurs?

- Ensure you and others are safe
- > If appropriate, protect your property and contents, but do not take unnecessary risks
- > The Worsley Arms Hotel has kindly agreed to act as an Emergency Centre providing basic facilities in an emergency.

What to do if property or contents are damaged?

- Ryedale District Council can supply flood packs with materials useful for cleaning. After insurers have checked the damage the council can also arrange for free removal of damaged items.
- Bogus builders, electricians etc may take advantage of an emergency situation and need to be avoided. Quotes should be obtained from reputable firms.
- Insurance companies should be contacted as soon as possible after an incident to get approval before making arrangements for repairs. They will advise what repairs are covered by your policy.
- > If householders are not insured Ryedale Council provide information on hardship grants etc.
- > In rented properties the landlord should be contacted along with your insurance company.
- Clearing up after a flood, depending on the severity of damage can be a worrying period. Homes/businesses may need cleaning, disinfecting or repairing, and temporary accommodation be obtained. Cleaning is normally the responsibility of the homeowner but volunteers could be called upon to assist as necessary.

Further information, help and advice:

An opportunity for residents to meet those who can provide help and advice on how to prepare and what to do in the event of an emergency is being arranged in the village hall on 15th March 2012, everyone is welcome to attend.



Parish Council News

The Parish Council (PC) met on Wednesday 18th January in the Community Room at Hovingham, with four councillors and one elector present. The following items were discussed and decisions made:

Library Supermobile; Is being well supported. The Estate has agreed this can be parked in Hall Green when it comes on alternate Monday evenings.

Emergency Plan Exhibition. The Deputy Flood Warden, Mr. David Richardson, reported that the Hovingham Emergency/Flood Plan is now in place. An exhibition, to be held in Hovingham Village Hall, is planned for March 15th. A letter will be sent to every household giving information, and posters put up in nearby villages.

Railings; Concern was expressed at the poor state of the black strap rails around Hall Green, making it difficult for volunteer painters to achieve an effective covering. It was agreed a professional painter should be asked for advice and the cost of repainting them.

Temporary Vehicle Activated Signs; These have been moved to Nawton as part of their three monthly cycle. The Parish Clerk will endeavour to get further information about their effectiveness before determining whether or not to request their return.

Recycling; Consequent to their plan to enable residents to recycle plastic bottles and cardboard from the kerbside, the RDC proposed removing the mini recycling centre from the Village Hall car park. Since this is widely used by residents and local businesses the PC have asked for it to be left in place.

Church News

Carols at Christmas

There are two churches in Hovingham (Anglican and Methodist) and similarly two churches in Slingsby. So it might have been thought that when planning a joint united Carol Service for the two villages one might be spoilt for choice when selecting a venue. In fact the venue chosen was Hovingham Village Hall! Not everyone thought it a good idea! "If we don't use our churches for church service" said some people "what are we to use them for?" "A Carol Service won't be the same if it is not in a church", said others.

In fact the occasion did meet with most people's approval. Approaching a hundred attended including some villagers who may not have attended a church service. It even attracted two couples due to be married in Malton later this year who live away from the villages. The atmosphere was more intimate and much less formal. The Hovingham School children who sang their own carols, accompanied on the guitar, seemed to feel very much at home; the readers could be easily heard and understood; the carols, the words of which were projected onto a screen, were sung lustily; the hall was beautifully warm and the mince pies and mulled wine added to everyone's feeling of well being. Certainly Bishop Martin, whose homily was both entertaining and thought provoking, was clearly most enthusiastic.

The retiring collection for Ryedale Special Families raised £157.11, which was sent off to the charity straight after the service. All in all, an experiment well worth undertaking! Thank you Beryl for your initiative.

Farewell

During the last four weeks, the local communities have lost three of our long standing residents.

Amy Smith who died in hospital on 21st December lived in Hovingham since 1932. She came to the village when her husband became groom for Sir William Worsley. She was a member of the Mothers' Union and later the Women's Christian Union. She was still knitting squares for Oxfam in her 99th year, only stopping after a fall. She was a widow for 42 years and is survived by three sons.

Brian Reeves also died in December, aged 75, having lived in the area all his life. He worked in agriculture all his working life, latterly for Mark Wilson. Until he suffered a road accident he was actively playing both football and cricket. He was living in Coulton when he died.

Gordon Scrimgeour_For a number of years Gordon was a resident of Scackleton, though previously he came from Hull where he still had many family members. Gordon died aged 82 following a few years of deteriorating health. A Thanksgiving Service for his life was held at Octon Crematorium on 10th. January and was very sensitively taken by The Rev. Bill Rogers. The parishes of Hovingham and Scackleton were well represented among the many family members and other mourners. Gordon will be well remembered locally for his work as a refrigeration engineer and his support for the British legion. Our thoughts and prayers are with Gordon's Wife, Ellen and their two Sons and families.

Village Hall bookings increase 19%

It was reported at January's AGM that booking receipts at the village hall (including a wedding reception) rose by 19% in 2011 and some enquiries have had to be turned away due to unavailability.

The management committee plan to provide growing support to residents in the current economic climate. Current rates will be held for 2012 with discounts of up to 50% for residents and regular users will continue, as will special rates for anyone wanting to run a trial session for a potential new regular activity (call Janice Wood on 628952)

Despite £6,000 of one-off maintenance projects (resurfacing the car park, repairing the wall, a new drainage system and external painting) with limited grant support, there was a surplus of nearly £700 for the year.

The current committee were re-elected under the chairmanship of Neil Booth; Kate Asquith has resigned, having moved away; Gwyn Green has been co-opted. Details will shortly be posted on the Hovingham notice board.

Vehicle Activated Warning Signs

These have now been removed from both ends of Hovingham, having gone to Beadlam/Nawton for three months.

In my opinion the signs are initially useful, but in time, possibly only after a few weeks, drivers do seem to ignore them. I have noted when the signs are in place there are very few vehicles putting on their brakes when the 30 mph warning flashes.



I feel the signs should be backed up by police 'occasionally' taking speed readings. Unless this happens and drivers face penalties they will just not bother adjusting their speed and will carry on regardless. There does need to be a stronger deterrent!

That is not to say that the signs should not be placed in Hovingham in the future. On the contrary I do think they serve a purpose, but consider there should additional measures put in place to reduce speeding through the village.

This is the first of an occasional insight into how I perceive photography, and how it affects me. I only became 'really' interested in photography in 2005. Prior to this my photography entailed taking holiday snaps, putting them away in a drawer and hardly ever seeing them again. Now, away from the stress and strains of work, I can spend as long as I like planning where to go next to take a photograph, however this is after the garden, the house, the car, the grandchildren, et al (which of course will always take priority!)

I do like walking and with my birthplace of Darlington nearby I fell in love with the Yorkshire Dales very early. I relish its relative quietness and the lushness of the valleys and trees. From this love of the countryside has developed my love of photography. I must add at this stage the help and support I have been given by members of the Kirkbymoorside Camera Club, in doing their best to help me improve my photography.

My favourite place to visit is the Highlands of Scotland, having visited there numerous times and always being drawn back each year. However it is a holiday and not a photography expedition, like the Yorkshire Dales it encourages the photographer in me to aim for that very elusive 'perfect' photograph, which unfortunately never materialises but still beckons! I also find driving north the scenery gets better with each mile, against going south when it seems fairly bland and featureless, especially on motorways.



The pictures I have chosen to go along with this article are firstly an image of wall graffiti from a long day out, taking photographs in London. Scary for a 'country bumpkin' like me and not half as pleasing or rewarding as a day out in the Dales! Having worked in London in the past some parts I do find rewarding to visit but there are also many places less than welcoming, where you need to be constantly on your guard when photographing.



The second picture was taken on a recent holiday in the Peak District and features a striking sculpture of a mythical winged horse by the celebrated Damien Hirst. This is set in the glorious Chatsworth Estate. An all day visit to Chatsworth wasn't really enough to see everything and we would certainly like to return, however unlike Castle Howard nothing is free there, you even pay to park!

The Peak District holiday was a revelation, busy at weekends with an endless procession of mountain bikers, but during the week was reasonably quiet. It compares well with the Yorkshire Dales and has so much to commend it and we will return!

The 3rd photograph was from an earlier holiday when Gill and I had an eventful journey to the Outer Hebrides (now called the Western Isles for some obscure reason?) It shows the Callanais standing stones in the Isle of Lewis and was taken on a typical wet and windy day when most sensible people stayed indoors. This location is on a par with Stonehenge in significance, but unlike Stonehenge you can walk about the standing stones as much as you like.



In my opinion Harris which is joined to Lewis by an indistinct boundary, is an all round better place to visit, especially the wonderful Luskentyre Bay.



The final photograph is from a recent early morning visit to the Humber Bridge. This is a most impressive structure from any angle. However this image I like because it shows it in a softer, colourful way. Hope you agree?




Hovingham Supermobile Library
