News from the Hovingham Village Market

We Need More Help!

Hovingham Village Market was set up by a group of volunteers led by Mark Woolley and held its first market in October 2009. There have been 60 markets so far and we begin our sixth year of trading this month. The market has grown and prospered and contributed a lot to the community.

But for it to continue we need more volunteers. Could you help?

Hovingham bus services from Monday 3rd November

North Yorkshire County Council have decided to reduce subsidies for local bus services. NYCC have terminated their contract with Stephenson's effective from Saturday 1st November 2014, with a new contract and timetable from Monday 3rd November 2014.

Details of the service to and from Malton are currently being finalised however, it is expected that there will be a two-hourly service in both directions.

There will be NO service to and from Helmsley as *"the service does not meet performance standards. Essential journeys will be catered for through a demand responsive service"*. The Parish Council and Action Group are investigating whether it is feasible to organise a mini-bus regular service with Ryedale Community Transport to and from the Friday Market.

Details of the final arrangements will be circulated with the details of the Malton service to Hovingham residents as soon as they are confirmed.

A super-duper new Supermobile Library - please use it

Have you visited the Supermobile library recently? The bus had been transformed. I used it mostly to return books I get from Helmsley library and could rarely find a book that interested me, but the brand new bus has brand new books and it's no exaggeration that there were so many books I could have borrowed I had to curtail myself! The bus carries around 3,000 items of stock, including books, DVDs and audiobooks and has disabled access. There is also access to the internet available via a satellite link. It's Flu vaccination time

Flu vaccination by injection, commonly known as the "flu jab" is available every year on the NHS to protect adults (and some children) at risk of flu and its complications. Flu can be unpleasant, but if you are otherwise healthy it will usually clear up on its own within a week. However, flu can be more severe in certain people, such as:

- anyone over the age of 65
- pregnant women
- children and adults with an underlying health condition (particularly long-term heart or respiratory disease ie Asthma)
- children and adults with weakened immune systems

Anyone in these risk groups is more likely to develop potentially serious complications of flu, such as pneumonia (a lung infection), so it's recommended that they have a flu vaccine every year to protect them. More information is available on:

Problems with dogs

Dog fouling: health

Following consultation with local people, Safer Ryedale is mounting a campaign to crackdown on irresponsible dog owners who do not pick up after their pet. Patrols are to be stepped up, and £50 fines will be issued to irresponsible dog owners in a bid to reduce the amount of dog waste left on any designated land open to the air and to which the public have access. So please carry a bag and bin your dog's waste in any litter bin in the area.

Why is it so important to pick up dog faeces? Not only are they unpleasant but they do constitute a real health hazard. The bacteria that can be transmitted from dog faeces to humans (e.g. EColi and campylobacter) can cause unpleasant infections in people. But the most serious is Toxocara, a roundworm infection that can remain in the environment for years. If ingested (often by small children) serious illness including blindness can result.

Dangerous dogs: safety

Dogs off the lead can and do bite, knock people over, run across the road and cause road traffic accidents. They can also frighten people.

It is an offence under The Dangerous Dogs Act 1991 for a dog to be "dangerously out of control in a public place, injuring any person while it is on private property; or if there are grounds for reasonable apprehension that it will do so". A dog does not have to bite someone to be classed as dangerous. If convicted you can face a fine up to £5,000 and/or up to 6 months in prison, in addition to the court ordering that the dog is destroyed or controlled in some way, eg muzzled and on a lead at all times in public.

So, please keep them on the lead at all times in our villages. And, for the reasons given above, they are NOT allowed in Hovingham playground at all.

You can report any dogs that are fouling or you feel may be dangerous to the Dog Warden, and report a dog biting incident to your local police immediately. Contact Ryedale District Council on Tel: 01653 600666 Ext: 208, or email information to: dogwarden@ryedale.gov.uk

Hovingham Playground



Have you noticed the playground has new equipment? Using Pasture Lane Open Spaces Fund new items have been purchased – a gazebo, a roundabout, climbing net, basket ball hoop and baby slide.

In the school holidays we all saw how popular the playground has become, with families from Hovingham and nearby villages taking advantage of the outstanding location and well maintained equipment. Some have visited from Norton, and even York, to use the Playground.

However because of the super facilities and location we have encountered unexpected problems, such as damage to the recently purchased football nets and the willow planting. This is a great shame as a lot of expense was taken up with providing the new equipment and maintaining it, plus the time of volunteers providing day to day maintenance of the equipment, grass and hedges.

It is not widely known that this is a private playground on Hovingham Estate land and its only income is that generated through fund raising, such as running a market café. And it is village volunteers who cut the hedges, check the equipment and tidy the grounds up - if you can help occasionally with this we would love to hear from you contact us at 628 227.

Two other concerns, firstly regarding car parking near the playground. Notices have been erected requesting people to park responsibly, but cars are left there, not only for playground users, but also by walkers, runners and those visiting the cemetery. If you do park there please do so in a responsible manner as this is a private road. Or preferably use the nearby facility of the Village Hall car park. And secondly, regarding dogs. To ensure the health and safety of children no dogs are allowed in the playground at all. Signs are displayed to this effect, please respect this really important request.

So if you are using the playground or just passing by please keep an eye open for anyone misusing the facilities.

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Over 100 residents turned out on August 4th for a brief and simple ceremony of reflection at Hovingham's War Memorial. This was organised by the Hovingham Branch of the Royal British Legion (RBL) to mark the outbreak of WWI as part of a nationwide 'Lights Out' initiative. Candles were lit for the 16 named on the memorial plus many others who have died in conflict and were being remembered by current residents. RBL chairman Richard Orange-Bromehead urged those attending to also remember those who returned wounded and traumatised who are often forgotten.

The bugle call Lights Out was sounded at 10pm, and the spot lights on the memorial switched off, followed by two minutes silent reflection on the 67 who served and on how the village today might cope with an exodus of over half the population under 50 years of age. RBL Branch president Dennis Anderson, then gave the exhortation and the candles were left to burn themselves out. Many houses in the village turned off their lights at 10pm as a further mark of respect.

Down on the farm

Harvest for me began on 24th July when we cut the Winter Barley. This was when we were having the hot weather at the beginning of summer so the grain came in without having to put it through the drier. It also allowed the straw to be baled next day.

After another ten days the oats were ready to be cut. This coincided with the hot weather disappearing and the cooler unsettled weather arriving; not helped by the tail end of hurricane Bertha dumping 2 inches of rain on us over the weekend of 9th and 10th August. Despite this we managed to get the oats in dry enough to put straight into store. We had to be patient and pick our time carefully but it was worth it to get the oats in dry.

The wheat harvest started on 16th August. It took us the next 11 days to combine 110 acres due to the showery weather and cooler conditions. Whilst the wheat was cut reasonably dry, it all had to go through the drier to take out some moisture.

The final crop is beans. As I write I still have some to combine but hopefully the next few days will see them done. Over the last week our area hasn't had the sunny and warm conditions that other parts of the country have had. We seem to have been stuck under a blanket of cloud which means that although it didn't rain, nothing was drying at all. Although this was frustrating it allowed us to get on and start to sow next years crop and so far we have drilled some oats and wheat.

The land is ploughing up pretty well with good moisture so the seed should soon germinate. It doesn't take long for the fields to turn from golden yellow back to brown again as the whole growing process goes full circle.

Overall the yields of the crops have been pretty good this year. They were sown into good conditions last autumn, had rain at the right time and the hot sunny weather in July filled the grain. However it wouldn't be farming unless there was something to moan about! The prices have dropped dramatically over the recent months to a level that hasn't been seen for quite a few years. I was looking through a diary from 1981 (the year I started work) and we were selling corn for the same price then as it is now! Yes the yields may have improved over those years but the cost of growing them has gone up.

Overall harvest has been fairly OK with regards stress levels and difficulties.

Yes the combine has had its breakdowns, the corn drier has blocked up occasionally and finger nails have gone black when the hammer being used to mend them hit the wrong part! It wouldn't be harvest without all that.

As someone said to me, it's the catastrophes that make the triumphs more memorable!

Hydrocarbon exploration & development - what's happening in Ryedale

Hydraulic fracturing (also known as fracking) to extract shale gas is generating discussion and interest both nationally and locally. You may have read the front page headline article in the Yorkshire Post (Sat 13 Sept 2014) about the potential impact on the Yorkshire and Humberside region.

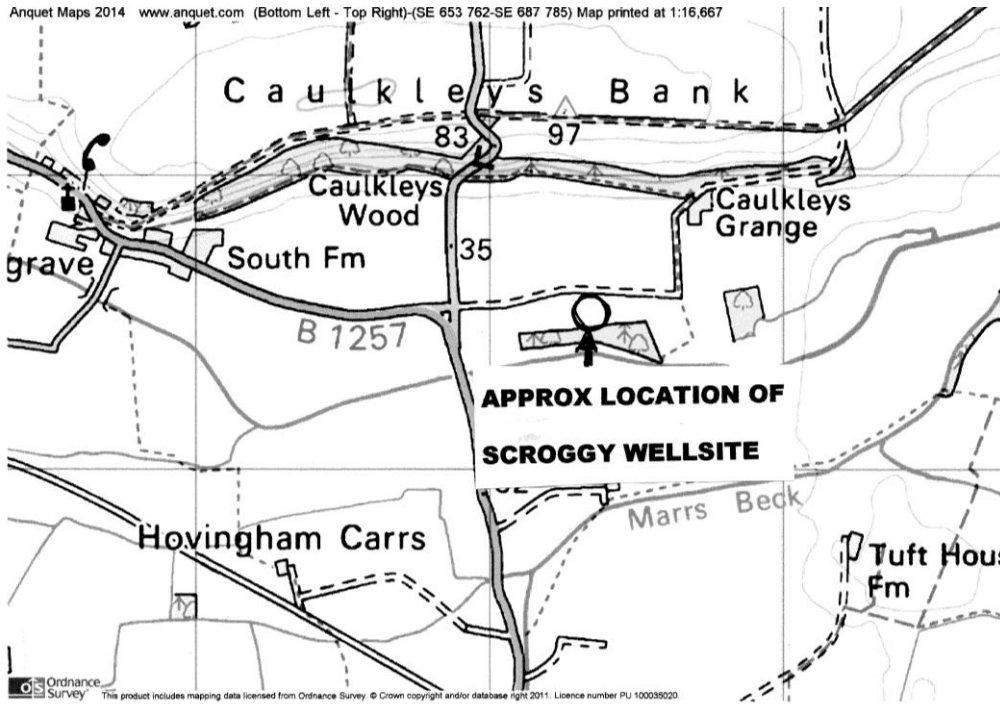
What does all this mean for Ryedale?

You may be aware that throughout June to August 2014, a seismic survey was carried out by TESLA in this area. Over the last few weeks, the white Land Rovers, other survey vehicles, bamboo canes, surveying equipment and streamers in the hedgerows have disappeared. The survey is complete.

What happens next?

The 3D seismic survey has been completed and the Third Energy/Viking companies will need time to analyse the results. It is likely they will make a planning application for exploratory wells in the area. This is already in the pipeline as 'screening opinion requests' – which are precursors to full applications.

Anquet Maps 2014 www.anquet.com (Bottom Left - Top Right)-(SE 653 762-SE 687 785) Map printed at 1:16,667



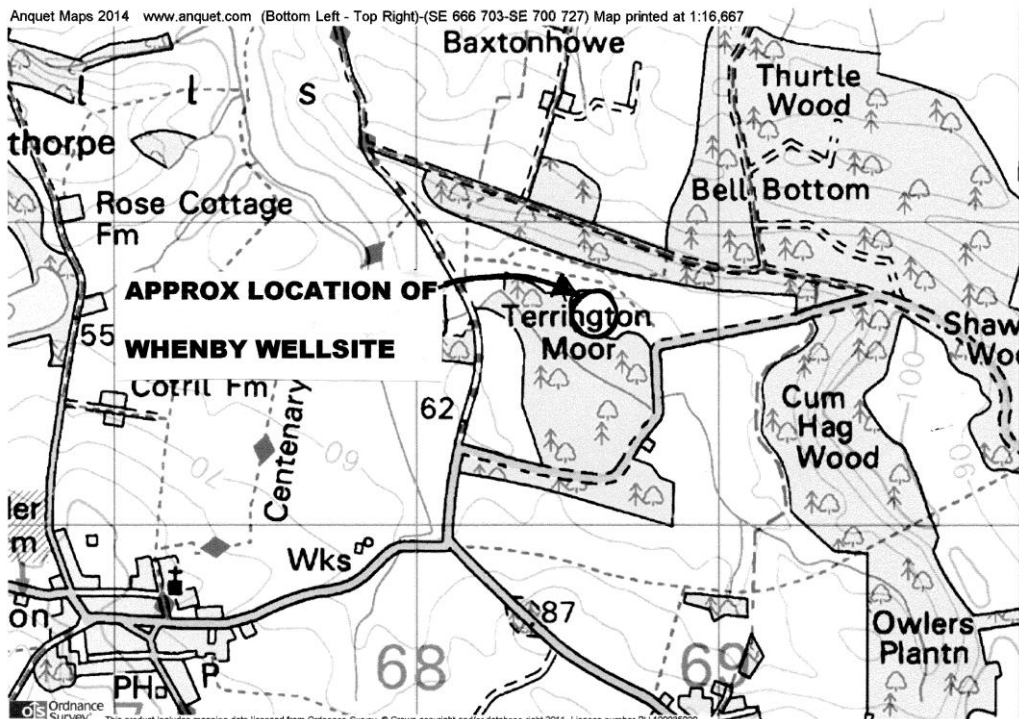
The screening opinion requests were made in 2013 for test sites in Stonegrave (Scroggy site) (NYCC Planning ref: NY/2013/0249/SCR), and Terrington (Whenby B site) (NYCC Planning ref: NY/2013/0137/SCR).

Both are within the Howardian Hills Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty (AONB).

In response to the screening opinion requests, the company (Viking) were informed by North Yorkshire County Council (NYCC) in August 2013 that they would need Environmental Impact Assessments at both sites.

Both screening opinion requests are for two boreholes at each site. In the documentation, the depth of the first well at each site is stated (1585m in Stonegrave, and 2000m in Terrington), which would be consistent with drilling for conventional gas deposits.

What is causing concern?

The stated 'geological' targets of both sites are the Kirkham Abbey Formation and the Sherwood Sandstone Formation. This is the same sandstone strata underneath Eberston Moor South. There is some controversy about reinjecting the waste water, a by product of the drilling operations, into the strata. Concerns arise about the purpose and depth of the second borehole at each site (Stonegrave & Terrington). The depth of the second borehole at each site is not stated in the requests and is stated as 'still under review'. Concerns arise as to whether 'reinjection' of the waste water would be applied for at these sites, and also whether this could lead to 'Fracking by stealth'.

Ryedale District Council does not have the power to make decisions on minerals planning applications. They will be one of a number of consultees, and will be asked for their comments on such applications and will have some influence on the decision. Consultees will include others such as: Natural England; Yorkshire Water; Yorkshire Wildlife Trust; AONB; Parish Councils; as well as any individual who can also object. Earlier this year (March) Hovingham and Scackleton Parish Council responded to the Joint Minerals and Waste Plan with the following statement: " we do not support the principle of shale gas development in Ryedale because of the uncertain nature of the impacts and risks involved".

What are the timescales? A planning application can be made at any time. Any planning application in the immediate area for mineral exploitation needs to be approved by North Yorkshire County Council. When a planning application has been made, there are thirteen weeks to raise objections and influence the decision of North Yorkshire County Council if an Environmental Impact Assessment (EIA) is required. For areas where an EIA is not required, the timescale is only eight weeks.

Aren't Areas of Outstanding Natural Beauty protected by law?

No, they aren't. Although the Government announced on 28th July 2014 that fracking will only be allowed in National Parks and Areas of Outstanding Natural Beauty in "exceptional circumstances", they have yet to define these circumstances. Recent publication of the North Yorkshire County Council's Draft Joint Minerals and Waste Plan confirms that Third Energy, Dart Energy and Egdon Resources are all lobbying the council extensively to include plans to extract shale gas as part of the Plan. NYCC are to publish their response to the consultation in December 2014

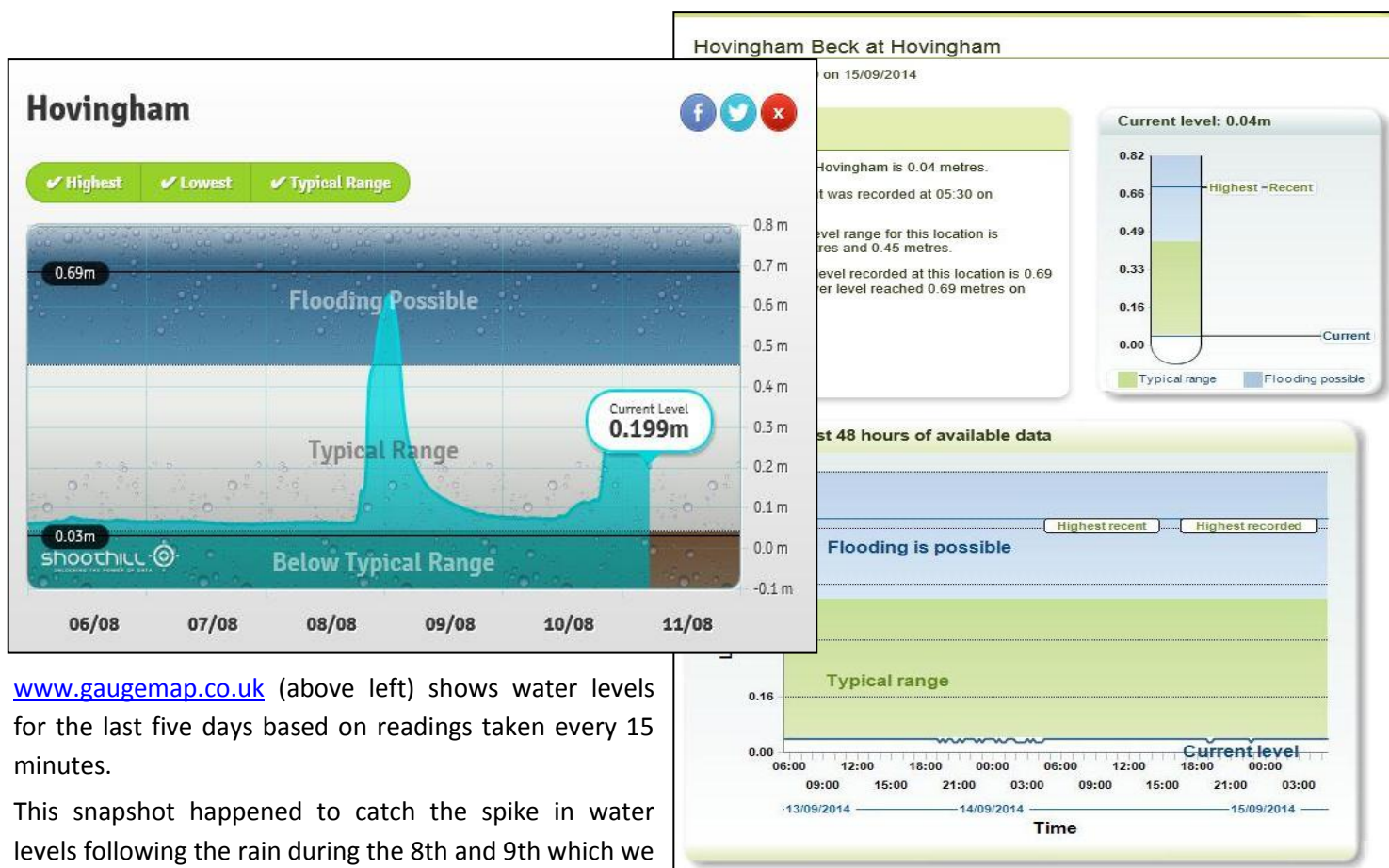

The **Environment Agency** provides details of the water level for the last 48 hours on their website (below right). You can also register with the agency and receive email, text or phone warnings when the beck is rising.

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GENERAL - Hovingham & Scackleton

- **DOGS** – Following concern regarding dog excrement, dogs not under control and dogs in the Playground it was agreed to publish an article in the Newsletter outlining the role of the RDC dog warden and the Police in these matters.
- **Grass Cutting** – The PC are expecting NYCC not to finance any grass cutting from next year. Councillors decided that the PC will now finance grass cutting in both villages to the current extent and frequency.
- The PC are still looking for someone prepared to cut the lower green to the same quality and frequency as the middle green.
- **Highways Repairs** – It was agreed that recent work in Church Street were unsatisfactory and will invite NYCC to a site meeting to discuss the problems.
- **Police** – Regular visits are welcomed and PC Paul Fenwick has moved to the Action Response Team.
- **TESLA Donation** – Councillor Mrs M. Bell wished to register her objection to the acceptance of the donation for the villages.

VILLAGE HALL CAR PARK

The following has been completed:

- **Storage Shed** – Moved to new location.
- **Gravel on site of old Bowls Pavilion** – Replaced.
- **Outside Electrical Socket** – Installed on hall wall.
- **Satellite Dish** – Removed.

Work still to be completed:

- **Trees along new fence** – Four trees will be planted.
- **Seats and Tables** – Will be purchased
- **Fence by Community Room to Bowls Green** – The Tennis Club will arrange.
- **Stone House Fence** – Will be pruned once end of growing season reached.

FINANCE

- The financial position of the PC remains healthy.
- It was agreed to pay £110.78 towards the increased cost of Playground Insurance, which is included within the Parish Council Policy.
- Monies have been received for the June VAT Return.
- The Audit Report has been received and displayed on notice boards. The auditors have again not charged for their services as there was no additional work.

FUTURE PARISH COUNCIL MEETINGS – 7pm

SCACKLETON

- Action on the pot hole at the southern approach to the village has been requested from NYCC Highways.
- Quotations for the supply of two dog waste bins are being requested.

HOVINGHAM

- **Buses** – There will be a two hourly service to and from Malton and no Helmsley service from 3rd November. (See article elsewhere in Newsletter)
- **Cemetery and Railings** – Painting is planned to start w/c 15th September. Repairs to the wall have been started.
- **Church Clock** – £2.500 has been successfully raised by the generosity of residents and village organisations. A quote to restore/repaint the clock face is being requested.
- **5 and 7 Hall Farm Cottages** – The Joseph Rowntree Foundation have now completed the shared ownership agreements on both properties.
- **Noticeboard** – An estimate has been requested.
- **Parking** – It is suggested that cones should be used to influence considerate parking at the Playground. There was no consensus on notices on Park Street redirecting motorists to park at the Village Hall.
- **Pasture Lane Development and Open Spaces Fund** – RDC are being asked regarding status of pathway linking development to footpath behind the Malt Shovel. The status of applications to the Fund have been provided by the applicants.
- **Pasture Lane Sign** – Has been replaced.

**RYEDALE DISTRICT COUNCIL and AONB
from Councillor Robert Wainwright**

- Sports and Leisure Management Ltd, trading as 'Everyone Active', will take charge of the three leisure facilities in Ryedale from 1st October.
- Outline planning applications for test drilling rigs inside the AONB have been received by NYCC, two at the base of Cawkleys Bank and the other between Terrington and Coneysthorpe. Consultation including the AONB, Highways and the Environment Agency will take place once an Environmental Impact Assessment has been completed by the applicants.
- Anne McIntosh, our MP, and Clare Wood, our NYCC Councillor, will be contacted by the Parish Council Clerk to determine the criteria for "Exceptional Circumstances" when extraction of shale gas would be allowed within an AONB.
