Under the proposals the libraries in Kirbymoorside and Helmsley will be run entirely by volunteers, and in Pickering by a hybrid arrangement of staff and volunteers. If enough volunteers can not be found (50 at Pickering, for example) the libraries face closure. Scackleton to host Women's International Day of Prayer

Down on the Farm

The last couple of months have been fairly quiet on the farm. The weather has been fairly mild but with bouts of cold so the crops have become fairly dormant which is what they need to be. Part of the year I have pigs but due to the sheds being used to store grain at the moment I don't have any right now



Winter is a time to catch up on all the things that need sorting out or mending. The corn drier needs a good clean out and check over which seems a bit premature, but it is amazing how quickly it gets round to harvest. Getting motivated to do these sort of jobs, especially on cold dark days can be difficult but even just spending a few hours here and there it gets the job done. I have started to check over the combine and replace bits that are worn or broken. My combine is nearly 30 years old but with a bit of care and attention it usually works OK. Again, working on that in a cold shed is very testing on your dedication, especially if you can hear a kettle boiling!

Another winter task is to go to training and information events. To be able to have a spray operators licence you have to collect points to prove that you have done some training to learn about the safe use of pesticides. The regulations are constantly changing so it is good to go to these meetings to get updated and also get some points. This years' topic was about the safe use of pesticides near water courses and the ways you can avoid contaminating them. Next to all my ditches and becks I have 6 meter grass margins. This takes away most of the risks of pollution with chemicals.

I think it would be fair to say that in this country we have the most rigorous regulations when it comes to the safe use of pesticides. We have to have a licence to use a sprayer, the sprayer has to have an annual MOT and we have an audit every year to check we have kept the correct records. The audit goes into such detail as how safe is the chemical store, do we have an emergency plan, do we know who the local bee keeper liaison officer is, has every field got its own record of when it has had fertiliser or chemical applied. You also have to record the weather and wind speed when you spray. If we don't meet the regulations and fail we are not allowed to sell the crops. Each load of grain has to have its own "passport" which we fill in with details of variety, have we applied any chemical in the store and have we done a "mycotoxin test". This test requires us to fill out form saying how we have cultivated our land to grow the crop, what rainfall came at certain times of the year and what fungicide we have used to prevent disease. The most important thing the passport has is a sticker you put on to say you have passed the annual audit.

Despite all of that we are currently being threatened by the EU that some of our pesticides may be banned and they are having a consultation! Every chemical that we buy has had years of trials and research and been approved for use. Sometimes people forget we do need to feed the ever increasing population and part of that is to improve yields and quality. Farmers have to use these products and certainly don't want to cause any harm to themselves or the public. If only the rest of the food that is brought into this country had the same checks and safeguarding that ours do.

Anyway enough of my rant and I should go and do some machine maintenance......Is that a kettle I hear......!

Fracking and Ryedale

It has been an eventful start to the year as far as fracking is concerned, both nationally and in Ryedale itself.

The Government has voted on and made minor amendments to the Infrastructure Bill in January 2015. It has yet to receive Royal Ascent and should it become law as amended it means that there will be no fracking allowed in National Parks or Areas of Outstanding Natural Beauty. This means that there are no longer any 'exceptional circumstances' that would allow fracking to take place within these areas. It remains to be seen whether this means just the location of well sites or if the amendments will be more far reaching.

Ryedale District Council are to hold a public debate about fracking at the Milton Rooms in Malton by ticket only on 4th February 2015. This was announced after a 1000+ signature petition was handed to the Council by Frack Free Ryedale.

Third Energy has announced it will apply for permission to carry out a 'Test Frack' at the Kirby Misperton Wellsite. If the 'Test frack' is successful they also ask for permission to put the well site into production of gas using Hydraulic fracturing. Third Energy have put in what is known as a 'scoping request' to North Yorkshire County Council which in essence:

- gives details of the proposal and the information that Third energy will include in their Environmental Impact Assessment; and
- asks the North Yorkshire County Council exactly what further information (if any) they will require to make a decision on the proposal

These proposals put Ryedale at the forefront of this controversial method of unconventional hydrocarbon exploitation.

So what does this mean for Hovingham and Scackleton residents? Third Energy hold the Petroleum Exploration and Development Licence (PEDL) for this area. This license permitted Third Energy to carry out the seismic survey in Hovingham in the summer of 2014. In the granting of such a license it is implicit that the license holder (Third Energy) will drill and test for gas and to assess the viability of producing it in commercial quantities (subject to planning permission) should the 2014 survey information suggest there are gas deposits in this area.

The proposals to frack at Kirby Misperton raises questions about how extensive the exploitation of gas reserves using fracking will be across Ryedale?

- Should Kirby Misperton receive permission to carry out a 'Test frack' and this is successful, Third Energy is likely to proceed with fracking across Ryedale.
- Based on the publicly available information, there aren't any known 'conventional' gas fields under the Hovingham
 area. However there is a considerable amount of Bowland Shale at depth in the area that can't be exploited by
 conventional gas extraction methods.
- The unknown is what the impact will be on Ryedale?

Peter's first task in his new role was to thank both Martin & Mark for all the time and effort they had both put into the market over the years, both being founding committee members of the market way back in 2009. Both Martin & Mark were each presented with a commemorative plate listing their time as chairmen of the market and a nice bottle of red by way of thanks for all their hard work.

Hovingham is recognised as a special place by residents and visitors. Many villages locally share the natural beauty of the surrounding countryside, the wildlife, and the visual harmony of the buildings. What differentiates Hovingham is an active community that makes things happen at a local level with benefits to the wider community.

Our Market and Community Café brings together 40 local traders with up to 800 visitors, establishing a unique monthly Community Event raising over £42,000 for Community Groups.

The Wildlife Group have built over 40 nest boxes, planted wildflowers, encouraged households in bee friendly plantings and building bee homes.

The Environmental Action Group volunteers clear snow in the winter to keep the Community going and active. They also repaint railings, clean signs, tidy pavements, build litter bins, and much more; enabling residents to improve and take a pride in their environment.

There are many ways you can get involved. This could be helping set up the market stalls once a month, conducting safety inspections of playground equipment, baking a cake for the Community Café, winding the church clock, gardening and planting, writing or delivering the newsletter, joining the snow clearing team or a committee. There are many opportunities depending on what you want to do.

The Hovingham Action Group ensures there is a friendly and safe environment for the volunteers; using the experience, knowledge and skills of residents to help others, and other organisations, who may need a helping hand.

Hovingham Playground - a child's paradise?

Hidden away at the extremities of Hovingham village, in an extremely wonderful location is a well kept adventure playground with equipment for toddlers to teens. It also includes picnic tables and a covered shelter, so all the family can enjoy themselves. You are very welcome to come down and enjoy equipment and lovely setting.

The Playground Group oversees the facilities and hope all visitors will have an enjoyable time in the playground, but please use the equipment wisely, as the group cannot be responsible for any accidents.

One unusual feature in the playground is the willow dragon, which was created by volunteers from the village, with advisors from The Howardian Hills AONB. Willow is very tough and for centuries have been used in basket making, fish traps, screens and fencing. It is also used in medicines and bio fuel. However our dragon called Draco - can be damaged by climbing so please take care to not cause any damage.



seasons and the elements, Earth, Fire, Air and Water.

Dogs are not allowed inside the Playground as they represent a serious health and injury hazard. This is mainly because of the Toxocarra egg which dogs' deposit and can cause blindness in children. However there is a dog hook and bowl of water outside the gate for those who bring a dog along with them.

Visitors using cars should park considerately as this is a private road and vehicles can, and do, block farm and house access, as well as causing difficulties for those attending funerals in the nearby cemetery.. Notices remind visitors of this requirement. There is ample parking at the Village Hall.

The playground is privately run by village volunteers on land donated by Hovingham Estate. It gets no public funding, so funds are raised during the year to cover all costs. Weekly checks are made to ensure the equipment is in good condition and any damage is rectified. Along with day to day maintenance, such as grass and hedge cutting there is a continual need for funds to sustain the well being of the grounds and equipment. The Playground Group appreciate all donations, large or small, to help with the preservation of this wonderful activity centre. Hovingham School News - there is change in the air

It has been a very busy few months for Hovingham School so I thought I should take the opportunity to update you.

Hovingham School confederated with St Hildas 7 years ago which means that Mrs Skinner shares her Headship time equally between the 2 schools. It has been a very successful partnership enabling both schools to share staff skills, joint curriculum planning and combined school trips.

Mrs Skinner has decided that she is going to retire this summer after almost 10 years of successfully leading both schools forward. Both Governing Bodies have been aware of this for some time so decided to explore the various options that could be available to us. We set up a working party of 3 Governors from each school and sought help and guidance from other similar schools and NYCC. It soon became clear that as the partnership between both schools works well, why try and reinvent the wheel! One area where we thought we could improve and streamline things was to join the 2 Governing bodies together in a Federation. The Government has said that all Governing Bodies have to look at how they work and the size of them by September this year anyway so we were ahead of the game.

The working party reported to both Governing Bodies, consulted with parents and also the wider community. A notice of the consultation was put on the notice board in the village and ended with a public meeting in both schools for anyone to attend. We have not had any concerns raised so it has been agreed by both bodies that the Federation should go ahead. I should point out that both schools will still keep their own individuality and character and the only difference will be one Governing Body of 12 members made up equally from both schools. The Federation process is now proceeding with the new body will be in place on 1st April 2015.



Voices from 1965

Fifty years ago, life in Hovingham was documented by residents to celebrate the Womens' Institute Golden Jubilee Year (1915-1965). Typed, hand written and beautifully illustrated, this fascinating and unique document records life in Hovingham month by month during 1965.

So what did residents observe about their lives in January and February half a century ago? The year started with bright weather for the wedding on 2nd January of Miss Priscilla Jane Keyworth and Captain Ian Roger Kibble (Green Howards). HRH The Duchess of Kent attended the wedding spending the New Year at Hovingham Hall with her family.

Children from the school met the children of HRH The Duke and Duchess of Kent a party at Hovingham Hall given by Sir William and Lady Worsley.

An increase in Agricultural Wages came into effect and was offset in part by an increase in the price of commodities.

The Cricket Club held their Annual Dinner at The Worsley Arms Hotel with 60 members and friends. A well known writer of sports books and articles about cricket, Mr AA Thomson, was a guest speaker along with Herbert Sutcliffe.

The death of Sir Winston Churchill towards the end of January affected the village: "we were filled with sadness, for on the 24th, we lost that great statesman, Sir Winston Churchill, in his 91st year...The funeral service on television was wonderful and inspiring, and it is one of the marvels of this day and age that so many people were able to pay their last tribute through the medium of their television screen."

On 20th February, Mr Alexander Brown of Hovingham married Miss Joan Heather Bailey of Penrith and on 26th February, Timothy Charles Featherstone came into the world.

Fascinating information is available from online archives.

This one is an extract from Baines Trades Directory of 1823 Hovingham (population then 649 - now 350):

3 Butchers 2 Blacksmiths 14 Farmers 2 Growers

2 Joiners 3 Shoemakers 3 Shopkeepers 2 Surgeons;

as well as a miscellany of trades; Stone mason, bacon factor, perfumer, plumber glazier, straw hat maker, tallow chandler, watch maker, school mistress, 3 victuallers (Talbot Inn, Lion Inn and New Inn), draper and tailor, milliner, saddler, basket maker, maltster, cooper, corn miller.

Scackleton meanwhile boasted: 8 farmers, 1 wheelwright,

1 mason, 1 grocer, 1 schoolmaster, 1 blacksmith,

1 gamekeeper

Today in 2015 we promote shopping and buying locally. It had a very different emphasis in 1823!!

- Open and Accountable Local Government –
