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Hovingham Village Clock - it's time for electricity



In 1879 in response to of the railway era the village clock was placed on the east wall of the Church for the convenience of the village and to enable them to have the correct time of arrival and departures of trains.

Since that time the clock has had to be wound manually every six days!!

None of the people who wind the clock are getting any younger, and in today's world of health and safety, climbing the tower to wind the clock is in the high-risk category. The ladder is very steep and you have to go through two trap doors to gain entry to the clock mechanism which is heavy to operate and requires a serious amount of puff to wind.

With this in mind, I feel it is essential that we electrify the winding mechanism thus negating the need to climb the ladder at least every six days.

It is the law of averages that at some point someone will fall and have an accident.

It will cost somewhere between £5000 and £6000 to electrify the winding mechanism. As it is a village clock and a village amenity I feel we should start a fund to meet this target.

Step into Spring at the Hovingham Market

Our next Market is on Saturday 1st April. Yes, it's April Fool's and the Market will definitely be there. With Easter coming up, you'll find over 50 stalls offering local food, rural crafts and seasonal creations such as Easter tree decorations by ceramicist Alison Bradley and Easter cards from Julie's card stall (Phoenix). We have much interest from new guest stalls and in April, we invite the Pretty Lovely Company (children's dress kits) and Loaded Table (fermented foods).

Hovingham Playground Group are running the Community Café to raise funds to maintain the village's special play area.

Hovingham experienced overnight rain before the March Market. This used to cause significant flooding in the Village Hall car park where the stalls are positioned. The new gravel trench soaked away most of the water. This meant all that was needed was a quick sweep. Thank you to Mark Wilson for replacing the gravel.



York Archaeological Trust invited Ryedale residents to bring along any pottery finds and share their knowledge of locally known and potential 17th Century kiln sites, and many did. A big thank you from York Archaeological Trust who described the response as "fantastic".

Hovingham Cricket Club ran the Community Café presenting an attractive array of cakes and raising funds for the local cricket team. Demand for locally sourced bacon butties was high with bacon from farmer, Pete Stark and rolls from the Hovingham Bakery. The majority of the Saturday morning stall set up was completed around 8am with many volunteers making light work and having a bit of banter and fun too.

Visitors to the March Hovingham Village Market enjoyed shopping in dry weather at over 50 stalls offering fabulous food and rural crafts accompanied by the vocals and guitar playing from local musician, Josh Finn. Three new guest stalls sold wicker and hazel garden products (Yorkshire Hurdles), Indian sauces (Really Indian) and British fabric off cuts (Georgina Bingham) and all are keen to return.

Look Out - there's a thief about

Living in Hovingham we tend to think that we are immune from the serious threat of burglary faced by those living in the big cities. However before you go out leaving your doors unlocked, you would do well to remember the incidents that have taken place. Over the years the Post Office was burgled twice, once involving the threat of violence. The second occasion was the final straw and resulted in the Post Office being closed for good. To my knowledge there have been house burglaries in both Main Street and Park Street at both of which jewellery has been stolen. There have been several cases of items being stolen from garages and garden sheds and thefts and attempted thefts of cars from Hall Farm. Even the church is not immune with incidents of cash being stolen and more recently the widely publicised theft of a priceless stone of archaeological value. The most recent reported incidents has been the theft of money from the bakery so soon after it was taken over by Simon and Victoria, and also the Worsley Arms and Malt Shovel Pub on the same night (as well as others along the Street).



Although we can never be certain that these burglaries are not the work of local criminals, we must be aware of the fact that modern motorways and fast cars bring us within range of the large conurbations of the North of England.

Part of the answer must be vigilance - to notice anything unusual or suspicious, and then to notify our Crime Awareness Officer, or better still report the matter to the police by dialling 101.

The volunteers split into groups; some were 'bused' to 3 locations on the entry roads from Brandsby, Stonegrave and Wath where they collected litter on their way back to the village. Another group walked up York Hill and at the same time a group of volunteers collected litter in the village limits. The filled bags were left by the roadside and later collected and stored in Worsley Arms Farm waiting collection from Ryedale Streetscene.

Many thanks to everyone who came out. Special thanks to Adrian Wass and David Davis for providing transport out to Wath and towards Coulton, and many, many thanks to Sally and Tony Finn for providing refreshments at the Worsley Arms Hotel.

Of the many items found and put into the 56 sacks collected the following is quite disturbing and shows how long it takes for the items to decompose, if they hadn't been picked up.

- Plastic bags 10 20 years
- Drink cans 200 years
- Glass bottles 4000 years
- Some plastics possibly never. This includes many vehicle parts left to 'rot' in the countryside and recovered.

Recently the Joint Minerals & Waste Plan (JMWP) was approved in part by the NYCC Executive Committee to go onto the next stage - the Examination in Public (EIP). The EIP is where the JMWP is examined by a Government body, the Planning Inspectorate, to check that the plan is compliant with National policy. The Oil & Gas Industry will make representations to the EIP; other consultees to the plan can also make representations. This plan will set out the policy for the whole of North Yorkshire with regard to all minerals matters. Other parties to the plan (North York Moors and the City of York) have still to ratify the plan. It is not yet clear whether there will be any further public consultation before the EIP.

Third Energy (who have permission to Frack in Ryedale) have a conventional gas site at Pickering. Although this is not a fracking site, local residents have noticed an increase in HGV movements and a drilling rig has recently been erected on this site. Third Energy have applied for variations to the conditions in the planning permission granted to them. They are seeking permission for vehicle movements to increase by 23% and also they wish to increase the time it will take to carry out the main drilling and engineering work by 110%. A few weeks ago, Third Energy reported a loss of £3.854m for 2015. You may wish to form your own opinion on whether this company is fit to frack.


In May 2017 we are able to exercise our democratic right to select councillors at County level. Nationally a new group called Frack Free United is raising awareness of fracking and encouraging councillors to share their position about this controversial method of gas extraction. Some local councillors have registered their interests. This means it will be clear to the voter where a candidate stands on this issue. **David Davis**

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Farm News

As I am writing this, spring certainly hasn't sprung fully into life! After early signs that the weather was warming up, it has now turned cold again with hail showers and is pouring down at the moment. Despite the cold, there are signs that things are wakening up after winter with hedgerows showing signs of green and even the garden lawn has had its first cut.

Once crops start to grow away at this time of year, it doesn't take long before they show the signs of being hungry and need a feed. All my wheat and oats have had a small amount of Nitrogen fertiliser to help them start to grow along with some sulphur mixed in. Years ago before factories were required to clean up what they discharged into the air, sulphur was available for the crops to take up. Now this is not the case so applying it in early spring helps the crop to improve its yield potential.

I am waiting for some Phosphate and Potash fertiliser to be delivered to spread on the crops. This will be put on in the next couple of weeks at varying rates depending on how much each field needs. This is determined by regular testing of the soil to see what the nutrient levels are. Nutrients are used up at different rates depending on the type of crop. For example, if straw is baled and not chopped and ploughed in, that uses up Potash.

All grain has now been moved from my store and delivered to various feed mills. On the one hand this is good as it helps cash flow but also means there is nothing else to sell until later in the year. It will allow the store to be thoroughly cleaned before the new crop come in at harvest. The corn drier has already been cleaned out by hoovering it to get rid of all the dust and dirt. It is something of an antique having been installed in 1968 but it still works and does what I need it to do. Over the years it has had various alterations and updates but the basic drier is still original. Unlike new ones that have automated systems to monitor speed, grain moisture and shut down if something goes wrong, mine is less sophisticated - I have to listen to the squeaks. Sometimes a squeak can be good as it indicates an elevator is working so if it stops, so has the elevator! It's the new squeaks that can cause problems...! They don't mention that in the instruction book, if I still had one.

Hopefully the weather will take up again soon and we will feel like it is actually spring. The daffodils look better standing upright rather than battered flat with this wind and rain. Once Brexit has happened and we leave the EU maybe we will get back control of our weather!!



Wheels2Work secures extra funding

Ryedale Community Transport (RCT) has received a funding boost for its Wheels2Work (W2W) service. The service provides *affordable moped hire* to enable people who live in a remote Ryedale community with no access to transport to take up a job offer, apprenticeship, training or further education. Steve Mellalieu, Manager of Ryedale Community Transport, said that the W2W service had helped more than 500 people since its inception in 2002. "There may be around 20 people on the scheme at any one time and this new funding will allow us to increase access to the service which is extremely valuable to people in our rural communities, supporting them as they look to get into work or training."

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

The exception to this rule is our salmon which comes from the famous Wester Ross Fishery in Scotland where salmon are reared without insecticides or growth promoters and enjoy plenty of water in which to swim naturally. This produces a salmon without heavy fat content, as near to wild salmon as it is possible to get. Wester Ross has received many RSPCA awards for animal welfare. Wherever possible our pork is sourced from Peter Stark, a well-known Hovingham farmer who produces top quality naturally reared pork, as many of you who shop on Hovingham market will know.

The business was inspired by friends and family who, having tasted our products, when we were making our own as amateurs for several years, demanded more and more. It almost became a business by accident at this time.

Our principal of only the best using local produce and focusing on the very highest quality is now paying off. We have spent a year building up an approved premise, a long hard journey in itself, which has taken a lot of effort and a great many hours in order to create a modern butchery and smoke house. Our sausage is very popular locally and is made with 90% pork shoulder meat. Allan says "sausage has been adulterated over the years with high levels of skin, fat and bone as well as very high levels of binding agents. We make a gourmet standard sausage with only best shoulder meat and a little gluten free rusk to produce what a sausage should be "a meaty treat that tastes of real pork meat". Salmon, bacon, salami, chorizo, bresaola and other cured products are made by truly ancient methods with a few modern safeguards that take time and patience however the end result is first class and well worth the wait.

Our sausage and bacon can be found at the Hovingham bakery where Simon and Victoria would be delighted to serve you. Gammon steaks, pork burgers, smoked salmon, sausage and bacon is also available at Terrington Stores.

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GENERAL

- Next Steps Charity Helen Clark of this charity explained the objectives of the group and how they could help residents. These were discussed and it was agreed that they would have another Community Stall at future Market hopefully preceded by some Newsletter publicity and followed by a drop-in session in the Community Room.
- **Dog Fouling** It is a problem in both villages that residents and visitors allow their dogs to foul and do not pick it up and dispose of it. Signs have now been posted adjacent to the tennis court in Hovingham and three will be placed in Scackleton and another by the School entrance to Top Green.

SCACKLETON

• A meeting was held on 7th March however, minutes are not yet available.

NORTH YORKSHIRE COUNTY COUNCIL (NYCC) from Councillor Clare Wood

- Budget has been set with a 1.99% increase plus a 2% social care supplement this year and in the next two years.
- Savings are still being identified as by 2020 Central Government grants will cease.
- Disappointed progress on Community Speedwatch despite Community enthusiasm there is no progress from the local Police or the Police Commissioner.
- Problems with local highways were discussed and these will be escalated with NYCC Highways.

FINANCE

- Financial summary was circulated.
- An outline budget was presented; a full budget will be discussed and agreed at the next Annual meeting.
- It was agreed to:
 - Continue grass cutting contracts as this year
 - Spend £167.50 replacing five posts
 - Spend £850.00 painting all posts and railings

HOVINGHAM

- Action Group A litter pick is organised for 11th March. The Market continues to be very successful with 80% of visitors coming less than 20 miles to a Market.
- **Car Boot Sales** It was agreed that the Church could use the Top Green and Verges for both Car Boot Sales this year.
- **Cemetery Wall Repairs** A payment has been made for the work carried out to date.
- **Flooding** The beck level appears to rise faster now that ditches higher up had been cleaned. It will be proposed at the next meeting to support the removal of several constraints in the overflow ditch, sharing 50% of the cost with the Hovingham Estate.
- Footpaths The footpath around the Top Green, between the Bakery and Old Post House and the footpath between Hall Farm Farmhouse and the Station have been tidied up and edged. The Parish Council expressed their thanks for that it had been carried out quickly.
- Mini-Recycling Area Thanks to those who tidied up the facility. A commercial waste bin will help keep the Village Hall area tidier. Residents are reminded this is the only village facility in Ryedale and it is for paper, tins, glass and plastic bottles only. It is not for cardboard, commercial or land-fill waste.
- New Pasture Lane Nothing to Report.
- Railings on Top Green It was agreed to replace the five missing posts are to be replaced and strimmer guards attached. All posts and railings for which the Parish Council are responsible will then be re-painted once weather permits.
- Village Clock Winder Project This will shortly be launched in the village and the Parish Council agreed to host their accounts if required. The framework will now be discussed with the PCC.
- Village Hall Constitution The Parish Council fully support the objective that members of the Village Hall Committee should not be financially liable. However, the Parish Council firmly believe the land the Village Hall occupies cannot be sold, or used as security, under any circumstances, as it is a village asset gifted by the Estate until it is no longer needed for Community purposes when it would revert back to the Estate.
