The Findings

There was outstanding participation in the 2018 Survey (84%) and the results provided a valuable window into the priorities and challenges experienced by residents and provide a Focus for 2019 and beyond.

Residents value their environment; they feel safe and want to protect it:

- Local views, peace and quiet, wildlife and walks and community spirit
- Sympathetically manage limited housing and other developments to maintain the village aesthetic while opposing some inappropriate housing and “industrial” developments, such as fracking
- Limit speed of vehicles everywhere in the village
- Safe crossing places needed
- Reduce noise, vibration and intrusion of heavy goods vehicles and enforce hours of operation
- Dissuade inconsiderate drivers re parking, avoiding pavements and damaging verges
- Encourage prompt reporting of highway, pavement and other faults

Residents felt strongly the need to reduce the village “carbon footprint” by:

- Strong support for increased Recycling, Reuse and Reduced consumption and more Energy Efficiency measures
- There was significant support for promotion of renewable energy uptake and community energy schemes
- There was significant support for a Swap Shop, Repair Hub and Share Shed

Residents highly value their local services and want to encourage and support them:

- Local businesses: Bakery, Hotel, Pub, The Park, Village Shop and Farmers
- Churches, Village Hall, and Market
- Mobile services, Library and Post Office were valued
- Newsletters, Notice Boards, Word of Mouth and Websites keep residents well informed
- Volunteers are valued and appreciated
- GP Surgery, more local appointments would be welcome together with more medicines available in Hovingham
- Public transport, more services would be welcome
- Police, a more visible Police presence and enforcement would be welcomed

And one common request, Residents would like to see **mobile phone coverage** established and improved.

Attracting admiring comments from both stallholders and visitors, we introduced a new look in June with the purchase of blue striped stall covers. Needless to say, they were duly christened on their first use with a light shower of rain. Sunny warm weather in July brought out many visitors (and dogs) and also at this time of year, holiday makers too.

We're reminding visitors to use the designated parking areas. We include a message in the Market News sent out to over 500 visitors a week before the market. We also post reminders on Twitter and on the Market Facebook page to encourage considerate and responsible parking.



We continue to attract guest stalls who often bring something different and unusual. Yorkshire Blankets are woven from redundant yarns from Yorkshire mills saving unnecessary waste from landfill. Our community stalls included Freddie's Fight to raise funds for local boy, Freddie for his treatment, along with Yorkshire Wildlife Trust, Slingsby Duck Race, and the Church Clock appeal. Community Cafés were run by, and raised funds for, the Hovingham Playground Group and Friends of Hovingham School. Josh Finn brought calm with his singing and music. 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You may have spotted a few regular runners around the village recently. The grandly named “Hovingham Running Club” came to be at the start of this year as a result of one of those casual conversations over a few Christmas drinks with friends. Yes, it was one of those great ideas “let’s start running and do a 10km next year”. Well “next year” soon began and suddenly the realisation dawned that to run 10km, it was necessary to stand up, walk out of the door in January and start running.

With the support and encouragement of Hovingham’s Iron Man, Jason Bertucci, as coach, Will Howard and Andy Royle have started training. They created a What’s App group and a rallying call for others to join them in their quest to increase their fitness and tackle a race. A few months into their training, and with a positive, can do attitude, Will and Andy decided to aim high and registered for a half marathon not having run in any organised event before.

So, in two months, on Sunday 13th October 2019 our valiant runners are participating in the Royal Parks Half Marathon. This stunning 13.1mile route will provide some distraction from the effort required to run around the capital’s world-famous landmarks, and four of London’s eight Royal Parks – Hyde Park, The Green Park, St James’s Park and Kensington Gardens.

They are both raising money for Yorkshire Air Ambulance which is an independent charity well known locally and needs to raise £12,000 per day to keep both of Yorkshire’s air ambulances in the air and maintained. The charity provides a lifesaving rapid response emergency service to 5 million people across 4 million acres of Yorkshire.

With a pint in his hand, Will said “we’re not the most likely of runners but we’re going to do this. We’re really grateful to those who are sponsoring us and by doing so, they’ll be saving lives in this region.”

A scenic walk from Nunnington

Enjoy breath-taking views towards Hovingham, the Howardian Hills and the North York Moors with this 2-hour circular walk from the pretty village of Nunnington.

Drive to the village of Nunnington, turn left before the bridge and park up safely and courteously in the village.

- Walk into the village and turn left uphill toward the road junction at the top.
- At the road junction cross the road and continue ahead walking uphill along a track between the fields.
- At the top of the hill at the edge of the bank turn left towards Caukleys Bank remembering to stop from time to time to enjoy the spectacular views toward Hovingham and beyond.
- At the road junction, continue ahead along the tree lined track.
- At the junction of tracks, turn left then turn right along Caukleys Lane.
- At the tarmac road turn left, look out for the sign for Welburn and Kirkbymoorside at a road junction and follow the road round to the right.
- At the bridge turn left over the stile and follow the riverbank with the river on your right, continue through next field with river on your right to a stile.
- Cross the stile and continue ahead past the trees as the river bends away to the right.
- At the next stile, continue directly ahead across the field corner re-joining the riverbank.
- At next stile, continue ahead along the edge of the field to a gate and continue ahead to Mill Farm.
- Cross the farm road and with the farm on your left, cross the style and continue ahead to re-join riverbank.
- At the next stile, continue following the riverbank then turn diagonally left toward the corner of Nunnington Hall boundary wall and continue through next gate following the wall on your right and continue ahead through fields to stile at the field edge on your right to the tarmac road.
- Turn right and follow the road towards Nunnington Bridge turning left before the bridge into the village and back to your car.

Philip Moore's Organ Crawl

This took place on Friday 21st June, starting at Hovingham Church. Philip wrote in his notes "In the first part of tonight's recital I would like to honour the late Laurie Gibbon, who was for many years Organist of this Church. I do so by playing the two works that he requested for his funeral, namely Edward Elgar's 'Chanson de Matin Opus 15 No 1' and 'JS Bach's Fugue in E flat major, the St Anne BWV 552'." Philip continued "Laurie was a dedicated musician and I valued very much our conversations about the world of music, cathedrals and churches. He was modest to a fault about his abilities as an organist, but I found his playing to be extremely sensitive and liturgically aware."

This was Philip's 11th organ crawl, which continued in Slingsby and Barton Churches. The first part of the concert at Hovingham was well attended by up to 50 people, showing that the event, which raised £146 for the church organ fund, is still very popular.

Ryedale Festival 2019



The popular Ryedale Festival took place from 12th to 28th July. This festival which started in 1981, welcomes performers, both established and emerging, from all over the world and has a wide-ranging programme of music held in the many spectacular and historic venues of Ryedale. The featured composer this year was Henry Purcell with a pop-up version of Dido and Aeneas as the opening concert in St Mary's Church, Lasingham. In addition to classical music there is jazz, folk, poetry, informative talks, workshops and exhibitions. There is a loyal following with many concerts selling out within a few days.

Hovingham Hall is one of the venues and I had a ticket for the concert by the Orchestra of the Age of Enlightenment on 14th July. The programme of music by Bach (played on period specific instruments) sounded amazing. There was a second Candlelit Concert in All Saints' Church the same night and on 28th July there were 3 further events in Hovingham including the final concert by the Northern Sinfonia at the Hall.

This really is a fantastic event and right on our doorstep too. There is a lot more information on the festival website but keep an eye out for the programme next spring if you want to enjoy music in special places.

I finished my last article by saying that we needed some rain to give the crops a drink. Well thankfully we got some on 28th May when half an inch came- 12mm for the metric users! This has then been followed by more during June when we had 2½ inches (69 mm). Some of the crops up the topside above the village on the thinner ground could perhaps have done with some sooner but at least we got some by the end of May. My dad always used to say “a dry May and June is no good for the topside land” and this is very true. Thankfully we did not get the heavy deluges that Lincolnshire got which resulted in flooding and some crops (especially barley) being flattened.

The crops have progressed well following the rain and do look well. Overall it has been a good growing season with crops going into good seedbeds last Autumn, a kind and not too wet winter and the spring and early summer giving both sun and rain.

The last couple of months have seen the crops receive some fungicide to prevent disease. A downside to the rain is that it does increase the disease pressure on the crops. I went through the beans in late June with a fungicide and they were as high as the tractor bonnet in places. If you have walked up Middle Way to the wood above Hovingham you will have seen them to the right of the track. I just hope they don't fall over!!

The combine has had to have more repairs on it than I was hoping. However, given its age it isn't surprising that things wear out and need replacing. Some farms use a contractor's combine, but we have always had our own. Mine is quite old but cheap and easy to repair and gets the job done. It means I can get on when I choose when the conditions are right and despite the odd repair and other running costs it is still cheaper than using a contractor.

I have had my annual Assured Combinable Crops inspection. This involves my records being scrutinised to make sure I conform to the standards set out in the rule book. Things like, individual field records of time/date/weather rate of all inputs, monitoring of grain moisture and temperature in store, pre harvest disinfecting of trailers and grain store, calibration and servicing records of sprayer and fertiliser spreader and the list goes on..... The standards must be met so they can issue you with stickers that have to go on passports that accompany every load of grain that is sold. Without that you cannot sell the grain. This is part of the Red Tractor Scheme and hopefully you will have seen the logo on food packaging.

My Countryside Stewardship areas have done well again this year. The rule book says that from 15th July I could either cut them for hay or just chop them down.

I walked through them just after that date and they were still full of flowers with bees working for pollen and quite a few butterflies about. Needless to say, they have not been cut down yet!

As I am writing this, harvest for some has already started with barley being cut first. The weather forecast is good for next week so more fields will be done soon. I am still a couple of weeks away with the oats the first to be ready probably first week in August. Let us hope the weather is kind and the crops yield as well as they look. But as the saying goes (my saying!) “it's not a good harvest until it's all in the shed”!

Where does the content of our Landfill bins go after the Collection lorry has taken it away?

100% used to go to various landfill sites in North Yorkshire. Fortunately, a new facility has opened, the first in the UK to use three state-of-the-art technologies – mechanical treatment, anaerobic digestion and energy from waste.

The Allerton Waste Recovery Park (AWRP) today takes all **household** waste of North Yorkshire and York; following its processing 91% of this waste is no longer sent to landfill, instead it becomes electricity (some used on site) with the bulk going to the National Grid with enough energy to power over 40,000 homes.

- AWRP is located near junction 47 on the A1M with the A59 from York to Harrogate in a disused quarry and landfill site.
- Operational since March 2018; it is jointly owned by North Yorkshire County Council and City of York and operated on a 25-year contract by Amey Plc.
- It processes 320,000 tonnes of waste of which only 9% (29,000 tonnes) cannot be converted to energy and is sent to landfill

How it works

A massive 1.5km of conveyor belts transport the waste after it arrives at Allerton Waste Recovery Park – that's three times the length of the building. While it passes along the conveyors and through the mechanical treatment technology, the waste is sorted with **magnets, sifting, trommels (large drum shaped sieves) and infra-red detectors** so they can pull out any recyclables such as plastics and metals which have accidentally been thrown away, which are sent off-site for recycling.



The technology also takes out food waste. This goes into the anaerobic digester, where it stays for around 20 to 25 days. The digester works like a giant compost heap and helps to create 1.1MW megawatts of renewable energy and agricultural fertiliser.

Finally, any remaining items are burned at a minimum of 850°C and used to generate electricity. The two operating lines in the energy from waste facility are each fed via a giant crane grab – each 'grab' of waste weighs between five and seven tonnes. The energy from waste facility operates 24/7. this generates 24MW of electricity and 4% as an aggregate used in the construction industry. Only steam and carbon dioxide leave the chimney (which is monitored by the Environment Agency).



10 local residents who saw it all for themselves very recently were relieved that such a facility existed to reduce the problems of landfill and they agreed the technology was 'impressive'. It was interesting to note that 'public tours' were welcome and staff seemed genuinely proud of the work they were doing and happy to talk to us. And outside, surrounding the plant, were extensive planted wildflower meadows absolutely buzzing with bees and bugs.

Despite this impressive achievement, it is not a total solution; residents should still **REDUCE** their consumption of materials; **REUSE** wherever possible; **RECYCLE** using recycling collections for clean and uncontaminated paper, plastic, glass and metal and recycle other items at the local recycling centres.

The heat is rising

Temperatures were expected to hit 36C on Wednesday, 24 July, and rise further on Thursday, when a number of records could be broken.

While the previous top temperature overall was 38.5C, the hottest July day was recorded at Heathrow airport on 1 July 2015, when temperatures peaked at 36.7C.

Only three of the top 10 hottest temperatures in the UK have been recorded in July, according to Met Office figures, the others were all in August. Eight out of the top 10 were registered in the past 30 years.

Mrs Hackett (left) and Miss Emily Sawdon collect left over wheat tops from the fields into a sack, Hovingham, Yorkshire. These wheat tops will be used to supplement the poultry feed rations in the village.

It is interesting to see the ladies are smartly dressed in their 'best' with coats and even a hat, there even appear to be gloves on the pocket of Mrs Hackett's coat! Did people really dress that way to collect wheat tops?? Any further information would be welcome.

These photographs are all of such high quality, they give the impression this was a 'Propaganda' series to bolster the war effort.

On a sunny afternoon in Hovingham, 82-year-old Dickinson Oldfield picks caterpillars by hand from the cabbages grown in the village by the Local Produce Association. Mr Oldfield was born in Hovingham.

This makes mention of a Village/Local produce Association and a search on the internet revealed a delightful 12-minute movie, albeit from the Cotswolds but on the same subject, growing your own, rabbit club, pig clubs, market stall selling for the surplus. An echo of current thinking to 'buy' local.

Fracking – what's happening locally

Third Energy sale - Third Energy has finalised the sale of its onshore business. The sale of the entire share capital of Third Energy Onshore Limited to York Energy (UK) Holdings Ltd was completed on 9th July. York Energy was incorporated in February 2019 and is described as an affiliate of Alpha Energy, a US company which invests in "overlooked conventional fields". Alpha is a new company, set up in March 2017 shortly before its CEO Tom Reed had his contract terminated as CEO at JXX on 31 July 2017. The intention is for Third Energy's onshore business to continue to operate with the current management and staff. Shortly after the sale of Third Energy, Mr Linn, previously Chief Operating Officer of Third Energy Onshore was appointed Chief Executive Officer of the new entity Third Energy Onshore Limited (Third Energy Onshore).

Planning applications – Third Energy has submitted multiple planning application extensions for 17 years for all of its Ryedale sites. The purpose of the extensions and justification for the extended length is unknown resulting in speculation.

The Minerals and Waste Joint Plan - The county, along with the city of York and the North York Moors National Park, have been working since 2013 on a joint mineral plan, which will set policy for onshore gas until 2030. Another consultation has recently closed about the effect on the plan of a High Court judgement about government support for fracking.

The background to this was that a landmark legal ruling determined that a key section of the National Planning Policy Framework was unlawful. Paragraph 209a required mineral planning authorities 'to recognise the benefits of onshore oil and gas for energy security and transition to a low carbon economy'.

Elizabeth Ord, the government-appointed inspector overseeing the North Yorkshire Minerals Plan sought comments from participants including local authorities, campaign and community groups and shale gas companies on the impact of the judgement. The main modifications to the plan cannot be made until Ms Ord has considered the submissions. The North Yorkshire region has more than 20 exploration licences, many targeting shale gas.

It is five years since the first seismic tests were undertaken around Hovingham. Hovingham is in the Petroleum Exploration and Development Licence Area PL79.
