I was really pleased to win the trophy for "Best Dressage at Camp" and the trophy for "Best in Ride".



This small Ryedale village has quite a story. In a decade, we've a raised over £125,000 benefitting over 60 community groups; a grown from an average of 20 stalls to 60 stalls per market;

won many awards; and

4 achieved all of this with a 100% volunteer run market

Ten of our original stallholders have attended most markets from the start. One of these, Janet Stark (The Wall@Coulton), is rightly proud of the fact that she has been at every market for 10 years.

We've achieved all of this through support from our community, volunteers, stallholders, local business partners, the Hovingham & Scackleton Parish Council, the Action Group and residents who took the concept of a market and made it a reality including Mark Woolley, Martin and Margaret Bell, Richard Wood, Phil and Ann Chapman and Pete & Chris Stark and family.

- Sir William Worsley will formally open the Market and say a few words.
- We'll also have a fantastic cake. This will be cut at 1pm and distributed to Stallholders and Volunteers.

Farm News

Well harvest has been and gone. Sounds straight forward when you say it like that however reality is a little different.

Got the combine warmed up at the end of July by going to cut some barley for a neighbour because their combine had broken down. Did about 25 acres in between the showers that had started to appear after the hot weather had disappeared! It gave me the chance to make sure the combine was running OK before I started my crops.

My first crop to cut were the oats. Only had 34 acres but it took four days as we were rained off twice! Despite that I managed to get them cut dry enough to put straight in the shed without drying them. Overall, they yielded pretty well plus a good crop of straw too. They were sold a few months ago to move in November and December.

It was straight into the wheat after the oats and after cutting the first field it rained again! No combining for 5 days, cut another field then it rained again! This time we got 15mm over those 5 days so it was quite wet. This was just before Countryfile at Castle Howard so anyone who went on the Friday or Saturday will remember just how muddy it was. We finally got harvesting again after a week but only for 2 days before the showers came back.

It was starting to get a bit frustrating but thankfully the weather took a turn for the better and over the August bank holiday weekend it got hot again. We got on very well and had 4 good days when we got the rest of the wheat cut and a lot of straw baled. The wheat came in dry and just got tipped in the shed and heaped up with air blowing through it to keep it cool. All was well-until the forklift refused to move when it was parked in the most unhelpful place in the shed! Got it dragged out with a chain and tractor but found a drive gear had stripped the threads and there wasn't one of those parts in the country but had to come from France. Finding out that France spend most of August on holiday and nobody could say when the part would arrive wasn't helpful. It was out of action for 2 weeks but with the kind help of neighbours I was able to manage.

Last to cut were the beans in the first week of September. Again, some showers to disrupt it but I got them done and they were just about dry enough to be put straight into the shed.

Overall the yields have been good. The beans were a little disappointing but not a disaster. The weather as usual proved frustrating at times and getting cross when the forecast was wrong (which it frequently was) didn't seem to help either.



A downside of a generally good harvest across the country is that the price has dropped, which is quite usual. There is an opportunity to 'forward sell' before harvest if you think the price is good at the time, but the difficulty is that you never know how well the crops will yield. Not good to sell more than you have! Finally, thanks to Graham for driving the combine when I had to be the lad in the yard looking after the drier, James for driving tractor and trailer and Clare for being outside catering manager.

I really should thank the hotel for providing a place for a therapeutic pint to compare various disasters with the neighbours.....

Recycling clarity

Plastic recycling is regularly in the headlines especially since the recent BBC documentaries 'Blue Planet II' and more recently 'War on Plastic'.

According to our recent survey the current trend in Hovingham on recycling plastic and metal is at 94%. In order to help with the correct sorting and segregation of recyclable plastic Hovingham Action Group Project Purple have researched what plastics are commonly recycled and accepted by Ryedale District Council below is the list of the can and the can't.

Those that you cannot recycle should be **put in your Land Fill Bin**. These bins are later processed at the Allerton Park facility, so they do not actually end up in landfill but are used to generate electricity. See our article in the August Newsletter.

Additional recycling tips:

Batteries can be safely recycled at most large supermarkets, including Morrison's in Malton.

Tetra Packs and **Elopak**; juice cartons, milk cartons, paper cups, paper coffee cups, other beverage cartons, soup, tomato and other food cartons. All these can be recycled at <u>Wentworth Street Car Park, MALTON</u> and St. Nicholas Street Car Park, <u>NORTON</u>

Why we need to pick up and carefully throw away Dog Poo

It is every dog owner's legal and moral duty to clean up after their dog.

There seems to be an increase in the amount of dog waste on greens and pavements again, and waste bags pushed into hedgerows, fences and the like. Dog faeces are not only unpleasant but can be a real health hazard. Several bacteria can be transmitted from dog faeces to humans including campylobacter and E. Coli. and these can cause nasty infections in people. However, the major health concern for humans is the risk of Toxocara roundworm infection. Dog faeces from infected dogs can contain toxocara eggs and these eggs can remain in the environment for years. If these eggs (invisible to the naked eye) are accidentally ingested (often by small children) then serious illness including blindness can occur. Picking up dog faeces is vital to control this infection, along with regular and effective worming.

If your dog fouls in a public place, please clean it up

Please Note

We have the power to prosecute under the Dogs – Fouling of Land – Act 1996. This Act allows for a fixed penalty fine of £50. In certain circumstances offenders can be taken to court where the maximum fine is £1,000 and a criminal record.

Hovingham Fracking News

Multiple Decisions pending about fracking locally

1. Third Energy's new owners, York Holdings (an affiliate of US company, Alpha Energy), have planning permission to frack in Ryedale until 2026. This is subject to hydraulic fracking consent being granted by the UK Government.

Before Third Energy were bought, they applied for time extensions to most of their planning permissions granted by North Yorkshire County Council for their sites locally. Decisions about these extensions are still to be determined. This means that the company has been operating with lapsed planning permissions since May 2018.

2. No decisions have been published about the two Government consultations. The consultations concerned making hydraulic fracturing gas 'production' a Nationally Significant Infrastructure Project and also 'exploration' for hydraulic fracturing of gas to be made Permitted Development. Both of the consultations were undertaken with a closing date towards the end of October 2018. The UK Government's Cabinet Office Guidelines on Consultations state that a response should be issued 'in a timely fashion, usually within 12 weeks.' If this is not met, a reason for not doing so ought to be published and a response to the consultations should be made as soon as possible.

3. You may remember that our Joint Authorities (North Yorkshire County Council, North York Moors Park Authority and City of York Council) have taken their Minerals and Waste Joint Plan to an Examination in Public. This plan once it is adopted sets planning policy in respect of Minerals and Waste throughout the plan area (including Hovingham). The final stage for the Examination is for the Planning Inspector, Elizabeth Ord LLB (Hons) LLM MA DipTUS, to issue her report confirming that the plan is sound. The Inspector's report on the plan will only be issued once the joint authorities have consulted on the main modifications that remain outstanding and the Inspector has had the opportunity to consider the representations to that final consultation. The Joint Planning Authorities (once the Inspector confirms the plan is sound) must then publish the plan as soon as is reasonably practicable. Adoption is the final stage of putting such a plan in place. So it is then up to the Joint Authorities to adopt the plan (this should be a formality - bearing in mind it has been through a significant process locally to engage communities and other interests in discussions about the future of the area), and it is expected that the authorities will proceed quickly adopting a plan that has been found sound. This requires confirmation by a full meeting of each of the Joint Authorities.

In September 2019, Ryedale District Council voted unanimously to extend their fracking moratorium indefinitely.

Following the results from the Village Survey various areas are now being investigated as to the best way to proceed. Some are more possible than others and some are short term and others more long term. Here's the current list:

Action – Village Design Statement (VDS) option - (Need to determine the effectiveness of a VDS as the best means of achieving the protection and future direction needed.)

- Protect local views, peace and quiet, wildlife and walks and community spirit
- Sympathetically manage limited housing and other developments to maintain the village aesthetic
- Oppose some inappropriate housing and "industrial" developments, such as fracking
- Value Local Businesses; Bakery, Hotel, Pub, The Park, Village Shop and Farmers
- Value Churches, Village Hall and Market
- Value Mobile Services, Library and Post Office
- Newsletters, Noticeboards, Word of Mouth and Websites keep residents informed
- Volunteers are valued and appreciated
- GP Surgery; more local appointments and more medicines available in Hovingham (contacted Doctors)
- Encourage use of Public Transport; more services would be welcome
- Improve mobile phone coverage

Action – Concerns about traffic and policing

- Limit speed of vehicles everywhere in village by selecting best options:
 - Speed signs
 - Active matrix signs
 - High viz signs
 - Better sign placement
 - 20mph near school and in Church Street
 - Community Speedwatch (Action: encourage volunteers)
 - Active Policing and Speed Enforcement (Action: Police Commissioner)
- Safer Crossing Places Needed near school, shop, Park St, elsewhere? (Ac
- Reduce noise, vibration and intrusion of HGVs, enforcing hours of operation (Action tbc)
- Dissuade inconsiderate drivers re parking, avoiding pavements and damaging verges (Action tbc)
- A more visible Police presence and enforcement would be welcomed (Action: Police Commissioner)
- Fixing highway, pavement and other faults (Action encourage reporting on websites)

Action – Environment and Carbon Footprint

Given the significant concern about our Carbon Footprint, Hovingham Action Group's - Purple Group are developing:

- Encouraging more recycling, reduce waste and improve reuse of materials see article on Page 6
- Improving home insulation and encouraging better energy efficiency
- Promoting the reduction of high-carbon generating energy and developing renewable energy options locally

The Parish Council unanimously approved the following at their meeting on 18th September:

"Following the results of the community questionnaire in June 2019, Hovingham with Scackleton Parish Council reinforce the Communities concerns over climate change and endorse the plans set out by Hovingham Action Group's – Project Purple."

Hovingham – walking on the wild-side



Gareth Roberts of NYCC presented the WSP report on Hovingham's Flood Alleviation Measures. The report should have been sent to the Parish Council prior to the meeting, it had not been received and he brought a paper copy to the meeting.

HOVINGHAM

Action Group Report has been circulated. It includes an Action Plan and the following was unanimously agreed: "Following the results of the community questionnaire in June 2019, Hovingham with Scackleton Parish Council reinforce the community's concerns over climate change and endorse the plans set out by Hovingham Action Groups – Project Purple."

Armistice Commemorative Tree – An oak tree will be planted on 1st December 2019 on the grass verge alongside the wall near the gate to Hovingham Hall and the Church.

Bus Timetable Coastliner have reduced service and passengers are experiencing problems when buses arrive very late after traffic congestion on the A64. The Parish Council will write to Coastliner, cc NYCC, to make them aware of the problems this unreliable service is causing.

Dog Bin Installation – This has taken place by the substation behind the Hovingham Inn.

Electric Vehicle Charge Point – BP Chargemaster have difficulty accepting the order, supported by the Parish Council, RDC and the Government's OLEV department. This issue is being taken up with BP Management.

Hand Rails on York Hill – Hovingham Estate have erected a new handrail on 18^{th} September. Thank You.

Hovingham Noticeboard – Source and cost of materials is being investigated.

RBL Erection of Flagpole – The temporary erection of a flagpole two weeks prior to Remembrance Sunday has been agreed. The PC await detailed proposal regarding possible lighting of the flag.

Recycling Area – awaiting details for RDC

Refurbishment of Hovingham White Railings – 11 new posts, 2 top rails and 2/3 metal straps neet replacing. A quotation for the materials and work is being obtained. **Seat around tree on top green** – has been repaired.

Quotations to replace will be obtained in new year.

RYEDALE DISTRICT COUNCIL (RDC) by Cllr Claire Docwra

RDC have passed a motion putting an indefinite ban on Fracking in Ryedale. A move supported by the Parish Council.

HGV Traffic – Following two early morning (5am) sessions spent monitoring HGV traffic, Claire will contact Hauliers regarding the Operator Licenses and their conditions. Moving the 30mph speed limit, about 300m along the Brandsby Road, will be Considered.

Hovingham Playground/Cemetery/Ebor Way – A resident has complained about the number of cars parking in turning area. Claire has had a meeting with them. This parking problem is shared throughout Hovingham and the situation will continue to be monitored.
