### **Pinfold**

- New sign has been installed.

### **Promoting a cleaner & healthier village**

- New signage for dog fouling is being put up. Increased number of dogs in the village with new residents.
- Free tree – having heard what Hovingham received, and the fact that you don't know what the tree is, this has not been pursued for now.
- Salt grit for Scackleton is still to be collected. Currently 0.5 Tonne is in Mark Wilson's shed. Rob Matthews is due to collect it and to deposit it by the large yellow grit bin.

### **Traffic in the village**

Within a week of the new sign going up, a foreign articulated lorry going to Mosey's got stuck at the mill. They did not get assistance from the farmers and had to pay for a breakdown truck to remove them.

### **Communication within the village**

- Circulating the weekly Hovingham & Scackleton Village Diary by email primarily. Occasionally on the notice board.
- Neighbourhood watch emails are being emailed out.

### **Community Events & Fund Raising**

- Still suspended for now. Will be later in 2022 before we can realistically restart them.

- The Scackleton Community Support Group is still in situ for the village, with volunteers from the village still happy to be part of it.
